# Hospital Pharmacy

Hospital Pharmacy has made phenomenal progress in recent years. It has accepted the challenge to assist in the elevation of the profession of pharmacy by training persons of high calibre in the specialized techniques that are required; it has adopted modern methods of institutional operation; it has increased its scope of service to the hospital, to the physician and to the allied professions.

As practiced in the hospital, this youngest and fastest-growing branch of the ancient profession of pharmacy offers excellent opportunities for women. Not only do you practice pharmacy—and this on a large scale of manufacturing and compounding—but in addition you are generally expected to teach *materia medica* to nurses and keep physicians and internes informed on new drugs, their doses and methods of administration. As a matter of fact, the greatest test of the technical background and capabilities of the hospital pharmacist lies outside the routine of prescription duties.

In the past the pharmacy department was shunted to the basement, to a side-room, or to an unused section of the hospital. Now architects who plan new hospitals are made increasingly aware of the importance of the pharmacy and for that reason place it in a main avenue of hospital activity. And in the design and lay-out of the pharmacy department careful consideration is given to the proper integration of such important matters as flow of material through a receiving room, storage and manufacturing and dispensing sections.

Many records must be kept by the hospital pharmacist. These include a record of all purchases, which may be kept on a Kardex system, another for each day's revenue, as well as a perpetual narcotic record. Then there are manufacturing records to be kept, the stock rotated, and an inventory taken annually.

Space does not permit of a thorough discussion of the varied activities represented in the hospital pharmacy of today. A partial listing includes filling of prescriptions, recovering silver from X-ray photographic baths, preparing stains and reagents for clinical laboratories, diluting allergy extracts, preparing buffered and isotonic ophthalmic solutions, manufacturing injectable products and tablets, making liquid soap, and dispensing materials for first aid stations.

Above all, the hospital pharmacist must feel that not only is she a professional woman but also that she is an important part of the great profession of pharmacy.

# Pharmacy – A Stepping Stone

I was delighted to have been asked to write an article on why and how I set out to develop my preparation for diaper rash, a skin irritation to which infants are most commonly subject. At the same time I felt it rather embarrassing to sing the praises of my accomplishment, even though I do feel like a proud parent praising her child—the preparation being my “baby.”

Perhaps my story may encourage fellow pharmacists to carry on other research to develop useful new products in which study they may use the special skills and knowledge learned in the Pharmacy Colleges.

The task is not an easy one, and one must be prepared to meet with many obstacles. The experiments are usually tedious and one never knows whether or not one will finally reach their goal.

It all began about ten years ago, when I accepted the position as pharmacist at the local Children's Hospital. One of my problems was to find a specific preparation for the relief of diaper rash, since the various preparations being used were not producing satisfactory results. Accordingly, I set out in search of a formula that could be used in the hospital.

At the very start I had to overcome a serious obstacle. Since I was the only pharmacist at that time all my time was taken up with the numerous duties of the pharmacy and I could not work on my problem. I was determined, however, to do the work and I found a way out. I equipped a laboratory in the basement of my home and devoted most of my spare time to formulating combinations of a number of ingredients in several concentrations. Every morning I would have samples that I brought from home ready for use in the pharmacy.

Having presented the problem and an outline of the research project to our medical staff, I had their full cooperation. The experiments were scientifically performed, with adequate controls used for comparisons.

Since diaper rash is an ammoniacal dermatitis I decided to use a neutralizing agent. Boric acid being the mildest acid I decided to use this ingredient. I also wanted to include healing and protective agents and thus came to the use of zinc oxide, zinc stearate and balsam of Peru in a water-resistant base (the washable bases tried at first did not produce favorable results).

Extensive clinical trials were conducted on hundreds of patients for almost three years before the desired results were obtained and the

doctors and nurses and I were convinced that the final product was a superior one. When applied on the affected area there was marked improvement within hours, in more severe cases the irritation cleared practically over night.

It is not only the proper combination and concentration of the ingredients but also the adjustment to the correct  $pH$  that is responsible for the effectiveness of the preparation. The three-fold action of neutralizing, healing and protecting results in rapidity of action.

When the project was completed I had a sense of satisfaction that all the time and effort that I had put forth were not in vain. I felt rewarded in seeing the benefits derived in using a preparation which produced remarkable results.


The physicians who used the product in the hospital were so pleased with the amazingly gratifying results that they urged me to market the preparation to enable them to use it in their private practice. It required almost a year to make all the necessary arrangements as required by the Food and Drug Administration and the Patent Office. At long last I marketed the product under the name "Diaprex." And I shortened my own name to Moss, using as a trade name "Belle Moss, Manufacturing Chemist."

I started in a very modest way and now have met with great success. I receive many inquiries from all over the country regarding Diaprex and its distribution is steadily increasing.

Still a pharmacist at heart and continuing to enjoy the work at the hospital, I am devoting only my spare time to my business.

To my mind pharmacy is a fascinating profession with unlimited opportunities, and one in which we can make many contributions both to the profession and to society.

## The Chapel of the Four Chaplains

The National Council of Lambda Kappa Sigma has voted to donate three Cathedral Chairs to the Chapel of the Four Chaplains.

This Chapel is unique in several respects, particularly in having three altars—Jewish, Roman Catholic and Protestant—mounted on a circular turntable. This is electrically operated so that any desired altar may be readily brought into position, thus making it possible to hold services of the three faiths in the Chapel. Each of the altars was donated by members of the respective religious groups.

The Chapel is a memorial to the four chaplains—two Protestant ministers, one Catholic priest and a Jewish rabbi who along with nine hundred others lost their lives in the sinking of the troopship *Dorchester* in the North Atlantic on February 3, 1942.

The Chapel is located in Philadelphia, Pa., and was dedicated on February 3, 1951, by President Truman. Dr. Daniel A. Poling, whose son, Clark, was one of the chaplains who gave up their lives, is the chaplain of the Chapel.


#### EPSILON GRADUATE CHAPTER


A belated presentation of the Ethel J. Heath Scholarship Key was given to Imogene Piper at the January meeting.
