“WE, the fraternity undergraduate members, stand for good scholarship, for guarding of good health, for whole-hearted cooperation with our college’s ideals for student life, for the maintenance of fine social standards, and for the serving, to the best of our ability, of our college community. Good college citizenship as a preparation for good citizenship in the larger world of alumnae days is the ideal that shall guide our chapter activities.

“WE, the fraternity alumnae members, stand for an active, sympathetic interest in the life of our undergraduate sisters, for loyal support of the ideals of our Alma Mater, for the encouragement of high scholarship, for the maintenance of healthful physical conditions in chapter house and dormitory, and for using our influence to further the best standards for the education of the young women of America. Loyal service to chapter, college and community is the ideal that shall guide our fraternity activities.

“WE, the fraternity officers, stand for loyal and earnest work for the realization of these fraternity standards. Cooperation for maintenance of fraternity life in harmony with its best possibilities is the ideal that shall guide our fraternity activities.

“WE, the fraternity women of America, stand for preparation for service through the character building inspired in the close contact and deep friendship of fraternity life. To us, fraternity life is not the enjoyment of special privileges but an opportunity to prepare for wide and wise human service.”

Benefits Derived From Belonging To A National Sorority

The following was sent to your editor by Chi Chapter and was written by one of their pledges. We are sorry the writer's name was not disclosed because we think it is a fine article and that its author should have credit for it.

History shows that man has always preferred to live and carry on his activities as a member of a group. In earlier days this preference for living and working in a unit was a protective measure, but though the need for this may have changed, man still chooses to associate with a nucleus of friends.

This tendency toward group living and functioning is beneficial to the world if it is properly applied. The purpose of the group and the manner in which this purpose is carried out decide the benefits to be derived.

A national sorority is an illustration of this group-forming motive. The purpose of Lambda Kappa Sigma, "by union to promote happiness and usefulness of its members . . . to create a center of enjoyment, friendship, and culture," shows in part the good that can come from it.

To me, as a prospective member, the key word is "friendship." That word, standing by itself, means having close associates in the hectic college world, who have the same interests and problems that I have. And an even firmer basis for a sympathetic and friendly understanding between the members is furnished by the bond of the sorority.

When applied on a national basis, this friendship has unlimited possibilities. It means having a country-wide association with people of similar interests. Through its alumnae chapters the sorority becomes an instrument for the betterment of the profession in its efforts to unite women pharmacists.

But it is in the chapter that the individual receives the greatest personal benefits. It is in the chapter that the real purpose of the sorority is brought forth. The quality of leadership is developed in the individual through participation in organized chapter activities. From the social affairs, poise and ease in assuming responsibilities are developed. Well-planned programs, at times including outside speakers, develop a broader cultural knowledge.

Of great importance, too, is the sense of pride that one obtains from belonging to a national sorority. With its scope being so much bigger than that of the immediate environment of the individual member, how can one help but feel it an honor to say, "I belong to Lambda Kappa Sigma."


