Ashland, Oregon, is the site of Southern Oregon College of Education and it is here where the Shakespearian Festival is produced each year.

Saturday noon luncheon was held at the Elk's Club, and this delightful atmosphere and the tasty food raised the spirits and enthusiasm of the tired delegates who had traveled approximately 400 miles to attend this Regional.

At 1:30 P.M., Saturday afternoon, the meeting was called to order by Third Vice-President, Shirley Lisman Cavanaugh. Inspirational greetings were read from our Grand President, Ruth Flaherty. Greetings were also read from the Grand Secretary, Julia Pishalski, reminding us of our duties to ourselves and our sorority. The following recommendations were passed at the meeting:

2. A transportation fund should be organized by the Western Chapters and supported by them so that more delegates could attend the regional meetings.
3. It was also decided that since Klamath Falls is more centrally located the next regional would be held in Klamath Falls.

The chapters discussed their common problems of raising funds, and the delegates reaped many ideas of creating interest within their own groups and the solution to their problems of meeting their obligations to the National Treasury.

Shirley Cavanaugh reminded the girls to send their \$10.00 endowment fund to the Blue and Gold Triangle before graduation or one year after graduation for their life subscription to Blue and Gold Triangle because it is through the National publication that we retain our ties with our sorority.

After the business session, the group gathered at Rainbow Cafe for a formal banquet. Dr. E. N. Stevenson, President of the Southern Oregon College of Education, gave a very interesting and informative address on the Geological formations of the Pacific Northwest.

Sunday morning the enthusiastic group gathered again to finish discussing their problems and to see some educational films on Enzyme Therapy with Varidase, Post Encephalitic Parkinsonism and Globulin Modified Antitoxins.

The Western Regional was termed a huge success by each one present and a vote of thanks was certainly in order for the untiring efforts of Norma and Clara Wells through combined efforts of their aunt and cousin for making all the arrangements which were so thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended.

ALUMNI MEDAL PRESENTATION TO MISS B. OLIVE COLE

Mr. Toastmaster, President Raichlen, Distinguished Guests, Members of the graduating Class, and friends:

In the performance of this chore, I become the envy of hundreds of graduates throughout the country. Happy am I, however, to have been selected by the alumni association of the School of Pharmacy to perform this unique assignment.

One of the great cardinal virtues of that master painter of them all, Michelangelo, was that he knew exactly what to leave out of a picture on canvas. Of equal importance it was to know what to include in a picture. And so it is with the life of our medal recipient, that she knew what to include in her life which has been studded with gems of pharmaceutical successes, well-earned and deserved.

As early as 1902 we read from the class prophecy of Franklin High School written by Miss Ellen Gray that Bessie Olive Cole was destined to become a second Susan B. Anthony.

Her training at the Baltimore Business College provided the entree for work at Sharp and Dohme, whence came her interest in Pharmacy. This interest led to her entrance and graduation from the School of Pharmacy with a degree of Doctor of Pharmacy in 1913. In the words of her classmate, John Wannenwetsch, she was "always quiet, unassuming and studious."

Her completion of state board examination and licensure officially welcomed her in the field of pharmacy, a profession which at that time could boast of but a few women. As pharmacist in the Solway-Annan Company she became closely associated with our beloved Kelly, later to become Dean. A little known fact is that in a call to duty she worked in the War risk Department, Washington.

On invitation in 1920, Miss Cole returned to her Alma Mater as Associate Professor of Botany and Materia Medica. Thus began the uninterrupted service to pharmacy which is so familiar to the most of us.

Despite her many activities at school, she found time to earn a Bachelor of Law degree from the School of Law, University of Maryland. She is a member of the Maryland and Baltimore Bars. We are happy she cast her lot with pharmacy.

Through the years she has achieved distinction in various departments of our school, attaining a full professorship in Pharmacy Administration. In 1948 the Alumni Association honored her with a presentation of a beautiful portrait to the School of Pharmacy. On accepting it in behalf of the school, Dean Du Mez said "Professor Cole has done much for pharmacy, which has and will continue to redound to her credit and honor."

On October 6, 1948, Miss Cole was appointed Acting Dean of the School of Pharmacy. The steeped in mourning on the sudden death of Dean Du Mez, the pharmacists of Maryland were justly proud of Miss Cole and her capabilities in directing the school during the interim. Dr. Byrd said "Well Done."

One would think that Miss Cole's long span of association with the School of Pharmacy and her tireless activities in behalf of state and local organizations would by necessity limit her scope of service. Instead, her interests have become national. She has been a collaborator on the American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education, Maryland Pharmacist, Maryland Alumni Magazine and other journals.

A life member of the American Pharmaceutical Association, and has served on the committee of section on Pharmaceutical Administration. Associate member of the Maryland State Pharmaceutical Association. Also serving as Honorary President. Secretary of the Alumni Association for 27 years.

I showed her the price marked on in black pencil, but she shook her head and said, "Oh, no you don't, it only says thirty cents on the front." What was there was "30cc. size." A short explanation of the Metric system sent her away satisfied.

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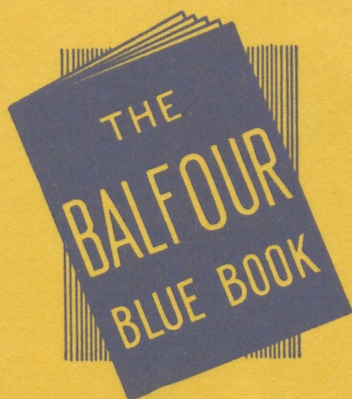
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
