GLUCAGON

The isolation of insulin from the pancreas and the discovery that this hormone is a specific agent for the treatment of diabetes have been dramatic highlights in the history of modern medicine. A second pancreatic factor, known as glucagon, was discovered shortly after insulin, but its entrance on the stage of medicine was much less dramatic. In the last few years, interest in glucagon has greatly increased as the cloud of mystery surrounding this secret of nature is gradually being lifted. The story of glucagon is proving to be a very fascinating and intriguing one. The medical importance is now becoming more apparent, and recently several patients were reported who seemed to have a deficiency in production of glucagon by the pancreas.

The first hint of the existence of glucagon was the observation in 1926 that intravenous injections of insulin preparations caused an initial slight rise in the blood glucose level (hyperglycemic effect) before the expected lowering of the blood glucose level (hypoglycemic effect) took place. At first the hyperglycemic effect was believed to be an effect of insulin itself. Later it was shown that the crystalline insulin prepared by Abel had no hyperglycemic effect. The hyperglycemic effect of commercial preparations of insulin was found to be due to the presence of a second substance which was named glucagon, meaning "sugar mobilizer." It is also known as the hyperglycemic-glycogenolytic factor (HGF) of the pancreas. The contamination of insulin preparations with glucagon is so small that it does not alter its clinical effectiveness. In 1953, crystalline glucagon was prepared, which contained no insulin.

Glucagon occurs in the pancreas of mammals and fish and possibly in the mucosa of the stomach and intestine of some species. The exact site of formation within the pancreas is unknown, but the acinar cells, which produce pancreatic digestive juice, are not the source. The islets of Langerhans in the pancreas consists of three types of cells: alpha, beta, and D cells. The beta cells are known to produce insulin. Many investigators believe that the alpha cells produce glucagon. This belief is supported by the findings that the selective destruction of the beta cells by alloxan does not decrease the glucagon content of the pancreas, whereas the destruction of the alpha cells by cobaltous chloride and other agents decreases the glucagon content. It thus seems possible that glucagon is the hormone produced by the alpha cells, while its sister hormone, insulin, is produced by the beta cells.

Glucagon has been crystallized and characterized by Staub and coworkers at the Eli Lilly Research Laboratories in Indianapolis. It is a nondialyzable protein of low molecular weight. The amino acid composition is similar to that of insulin, except that the molecule of glucagon lacks the amino acids proline, isoleucine, and cystine (which insulin contains), and contains methionine and tryptophane (which are absent in insulin). Unlike insulin, glucagon crystallizes in the absence of zinc or other metals.

The biological properties of glucagon indicate that it is a hormone. It is secreted by endocrine cells, passes into the blood stream, and is carried to the liver, where it increases the rate of mobilization of the stored liver glycogen with the formation of glucose. As a result, the blood glucose level is increased. This action is similar to that of another hormone, epinephrine. Unlike glucagon, epinephrine also increases the rate of breakdown of muscle glycogen, increases blood pressure and heart rate, and increases blood lactic acid.

The hyperglycemic action of glucagon can antagonize the hypoglycemic action of insulin. In experiments with rabbits which had been given large amounts of insulin, normal blood sugar levels were maintained by the intravenous infusion of glucagon. One may speculate that glucagon is a natural defense mechanism against excess insulin.

A few cases of hypoglycemia have been described in patients with a total or almost total absence of alpha cells in the pancreatic islets. However, no clinical use has yet been found for glucagon.

The mechanism of action of glucagon in increasing the rate of conversion of liver glycogen to blood glucose is presently being investigated. An enzyme known as phosphorylase catalyzes the first step in glycogen breakdown, i.e., the formation of glucose-1-phosphate. In the liver, this enzyme can be converted to an inactive form, which in turn can be reconverted to the active form. Glucagon seems to increase the rate of conversion of inactive phosphorylase to the active phosphorylase.

In addition to its effect on carbohydrate metabolism, glucagon influences protein and fat metabolism in a manner that is not yet understood.

There is some evidence that the secretion of glucagon by the islets of the pancreas is stimulated by the growth hormone from the anterior pituitary gland. The administration of pituitary growth hormone has been reported to stimulate the alpha cell activity of the pancreas, to stimulate the secretion of glucagon, and to cause a hyperglycemia. Thus, glucagon may be very intimately involved in the process of growth.

In conclusion, it now appears that the pancreas secretes two mutually opposing hormones: insulin, which lowers blood sugar, and glucagon, which raises blood sugar. Whether the physiological role played by glucagon involves a natural balance against insulin and a regulation of growth and other life processes is a mystery yet to be revealed. These problems illustrate once more the complexity and the interdependence of the symphony of hormones which work in harmony to maintain the health of our bodies.



PHI ALUMNAE CHAPTER


