WOMEN IN PHARMACY

Grand President, Sisters of Lambda Kappa Sigma Sorority,
and Distinguished Guests:

In behalf of the University of Illinois I am privileged to extend to you the greetings of the College of Pharmacy, and to wish you every success in your Fourteenth National Biennial Convention. I trust you will not interpret my addressing you as sisters as being any indication that I possess the privilege of claiming a knowledge of your ritualistic secrets, but rather because of the fact that you do qualify as pharmacists I claim that privilege of considering you belong to me. In fact, as I look across this room, I recognize a number of my former students, and in addition many whom I have known through the years as active participants in both state and national pharmaceutical associations. Mrs. Serles and I feel honored that you have included us among your guests on this occasion. This is of singular significance to Mrs. Serles because she is an honorary member of the local chapter of Lambda Kappa Sigma, and secondly, because she has been privileged to serve in her own right both state and national women's auxiliaries of pharmaceutical associations.

As I turn to the topic of my address, "Women in Pharmacy," I am inclined to report a few statistics, even though conscious of the fact that statistics are not only boring, but sometimes deadly to audience acceptance. A little more than a quarter of a century ago, few women were numbered among the students choosing pharmacy as a profession. Today 6.1% of the 93,965 practicing pharmacists in the United States are women; 1,833 of the 16,569 undergraduate and 51 of the 591 graduate students enrolled in our 77 accredited colleges of pharmacy in 1955 were likewise women; in the University of the Philippines the ratio of women to men is just the opposite, there being 246 women and only nine poor lonesome men; in the University of Puerto Rico graduating class of 1956 there is listed fifty-nine women and one man. I do not possess the figures concerning the enrollment of pharmacy students in the continent of Europe, but it is quite certain that for many generations women were admitted to colleges of pharmacy on the same bases as those prescribed for men.

As we seek for the factors which have engendered greater interest in pharmacy on the part of women in this country, I would select two individuals — Dr. B. Olive Cole of the University of Maryland, and Professor Zada Cooper of the University of Iowa, who were ever diligent in their championship of the ability of women to serve in the appropriate discharge of every discipline which the profession of pharmacy exacts from all those who practice it. In fact, it is my judgment that conventional prejudice was a dominant factor in retarding the acceptance of the woman pharmacist,

who might even be compared to what I assume to be your personal prejudice in accepting the services of a male nurse, yet I would gamble that nine out of every ten of you would select a male physician as your chief counsel in consideration of your own health needs. One must, of course, recognize the acceptance of women in our sister health professions as furnishing some support to the theory that women are equally capable of the rigors of scholastic attainment, the acceptance of responsibility, and the talents to perform any pharmaceutical service required.

In my own personal experience, now rapidly approaching forty years of administration as a Dean, I have studied carefully the traits of character, the physical attributes, and the desire to succeed, among many hundreds of both men and women. I am thoroughly convinced that there is no need for the application of two sets of standards — one to be applied to men and the other to women. These qualifications may be more loosely classified under the heading of personal attitude, personal ambition, and last but not least, I would choose to call personal dedication to the responsibilities of the profession chosen. These are qualities well known to all of us, but I fear we sometimes seek to qualify our decisions, lest they prove personally embarrassing, or we are at times too much influenced by convention and lack personal courage to evaluate our own inadequacies.

It must, of course, be admitted that there still remain a very limited few institutions in our educational system which specify sex as a pre-requisite for admission. I have not yet been advised that they accept men at Vassar, or women at Harvard. Co-education is, however, the dominant practice of nearly all of our institutions of higher learning. Co-education seems to even be evident here, as I note among your membership many married women, and I would only say to those still single, perhaps you have not exercised your talents to the fullest.

In still another area, the employers' policies of a quarter of a century ago were, in many aspects, a reflection of personal prejudices, based upon unwillingness to consider women as capable to perform pharmaceutical services. Certain menial tasks surrounding the retail store operation may have been appropriately classified by them as requiring only brute strength. Today many of these arduous tasks have been lessened through the adaptation of mechanized aids. This phenomenon is true, not only in a drug store, but extends throughout even purely industrial organizations. War emergencies did much to prove that the hand of woman was oft-times more skillful than the hand of man, and not infrequently their devotion to the task is more real and their accomplishments therein materially exceed the accomplishments of man.

In conclusion, I would urge you to devote your attention to the uncharted seas that lie ahead. There are in all some fifty-six distinctive opportunities where the trained pharmacist has fully demonstrated his fitness to serve, and that his accomplishments therein exceed those personnel trained in other educational disciplines.

As a final thought, I would like to leave with you this anonymous quotation:

*"What you are born with is God's gift to you.
What you become is your gift to God."*

When you'd tell them, "I am the pharmacist," they would look at you with such surprise and say, "A woman Pharmacist?" "Yes, a woman Pharmacist, they are in existence too."

Today, it is another picture. Women Pharmacists are more prominent in all branches of the pharmaceutical field. The attitude of the customer has also changed. He no longer asks for the man pharmacist, but, "Is the lady pharmacist in?"

We women pharmacists have pushed ourselves out of the back room, and are no longer shadows of the man.

The path has been paved for our women pharmacists of today. Let us keep them up front and let us keep progressing.

Lambda Kappa Sigma sorority is comparatively young in age. Just 43 years old. But she has been growing and expanding. We can now boast of 35 Active chapters, and 15 graduate chapters — a total of 50 chapters and a membership of over 3000.


