 - How do you encourage alumni attendance?
 - How do you program to interest both groups?
4. Five year pharmacy college program:
 - Effect upon fraternity membership.
 - Time adjustment of pledging and initiation.
5. Integration and segregation problems:
 - Membership within chapters.
 - Chapter membership with-in national.

The discussions were fruitful and I'm hopeful beneficial to all. It was pleasant to meet with other fraternity officers and representatives and to share ideas. And it was suggested by those present that such a meeting be held at the next A.Ph.A. convention.




Mrs. Eleanor Siwan presenting the new Flag of the United States to Julia Pishalski, Grand President of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

Here it is, Tuesday already, and we "early birds" are up with the sun to get the "Angleworm." We are soon on buses en route to the Ford Company, Rouge Plant—so named because it is located on the Rouge River. As we arrive at the plant grounds, our guide tells us "No pictures." Curses!! We learn that Ford makes their own glass, as well as steel, so that a strike in either of these industries will not affect the production of Ford cars. We see the process of pickling, tempering, and cold-pressing crude steel in the first building we visit. Now we see the stamping and cutting of

various parts for the automobiles made here. Many of the operations on the assembly line seem so small that one can hardly tell anything has been done to that part. We see next the boring and finishing of engine blocks and cylinders, and the assembly of engines from start to finish. There are more parts to an auto-engine than I ever knew about! Once all the parts are assembled each motor is run for 20 minutes under its own power to check for major defects. We again board the buses and soon arrive at the Rotunda. This building, the shape of a cluster of meshed gears, was assembled for the Chicago World's Fair in 1933. The shape of the building is symbolic of the automotive industry. After the World's Fair the building was moved to Detroit and has been maintained as a showplace for Ford since about 1950.





TRIP TO HIRAM WALKER DISTILLERY

Highlight of convention Wednesday was the trip to Canada in general and to the Hiram Walker Distillery in particular. On Wednesdays in Canada, most of the stores are closed, so we went to a small shopping center in suburban Windsor, Ontario where the shops remained open.

The Hiram Walker distillery is located in Walkerville, Ontario, just outside Windsor. We were not permitted to see the actual distilling process since repair work was being done, but we were taken on a guided tour through the packaging and selling part of the plant.

The bottles are filled, labelled, and boxed by machine. Then they are taken to shipping rooms where they go out by rail or truck.

The labelling process is most interesting. The main label is applied, and with it go several different tax stamps. Our guide told us that all breakage and spillage must be accounted for, due to strict government regulation.

Bottling was being done for the Christmas season, and cartons are stacked according to where they are to be shipped. We saw loads designated for many of the states and several foreign countries.

After going through the plant, we all went out in back of the main office buildings where the company gave us a garden party. They had set up tables with large umbrellas, and chairs. We were served from a tent, and the bartenders were dressed in Hiram Walker striped vests. These later ended up in the temporary possession of Grand Editor Amelia and Omicron alum Dorothy Gordon.

Refreshments included the speciality of the house, ginger ale, chips and dips, nuts, and pretzels.

The company's administration buildings are made of grey stone, and look quite Victorian. The lawn where we were located ran right down to the Detroit River, and we had a wonderful view of Detroit.

On the way home, there was some confusion as to how many people were on the busses. It seems the driver and Virginia Budden Omicron alum kept coming out with different numbers each time around. But fortunately, we made it back to Detroit in fine shape.

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Amount of Grant: The graduate assistantship is awarded in terms of room, board, tuition, and a cash stipend of approximately \$500 per academic year in monthly payments.

Selection: An applicant must present a Bachelor's or a Master's degree from an accredited institution. Personal qualifications, academic record, work experience and demonstrated interest in the field of human relations are the bases of selection. Appointments are made in April for the following school year.

Laboratory-Work Program: Each appointee is responsible for and lives in a residence with a group of undergraduate women. Here, under supervision, she applies the theory she studies in the formal courses.

In addition, the appointee works in administrative offices, chiefly the office of the dean of women, where she observes and practices personnel techniques.

Study Program: The program makes full use of the resources available on a large university campus. In addition, about twenty specialists and lecturers, some from the campus and some from outside, contribute to the program.

Training Period: The usual appointment is for two years on a part-time practice, part-time study basis. Occasionally one-year awards are made to applicants on leave from student personnel positions.

Degrees Awarded: Students may become candidates for Masters' or Doctors' degrees, majoring in student personnel work in the School of Education or in any fields available at Syracuse University for which they can qualify. The major courses in student personnel work are required of all students holding these assistantships.

Placement: A well established placement service has operated for a quarter century. Several hundred graduates of this program are presently professionally employed in such student personnel positions as deans of students; deans of women; freshman counselors; directors of social activities, housing, residence halls, student unions; and educational and vocational guidance counselors at the secondary school and college levels.
