Professional Panhellenic Association Convention Dearborn, Michigan November 5-7, 1959

Lambda Kappa Sigma was one of the seventeen member fraternities represented at the 19th Biennial Convention of the Professional Panhellenic Association which was held at Dearborn, Michigan on November 5-7, 1959. The Detroit Area PPA members acted as official hostesses. The official representative of Lambda Kappa Sigma to that convention was your Grand President, Julia Pishalski.

It was brought out at one of the round-table discussions that the purpose of a convention was to love, (fellowship); to play, (social); to honor, (award); and to learn (workshop). It was most gratifying to find that that definition was most complete having had the opportunity to meet with the leaders of the other member fraternities, representing the varied fields of endeavor that compose PPA.

Round-tables were held on many subjects: Fraternity Finance, Fraternity Publicity, Fraternity Publications, Membership Selection, Fraternity Education, City Panhellenics, Alumnae Interest, Fraternity Conventions and many others. It was most stimulating to listen to solutions of problems that member fraternities may have experienced and to know that we were not alone in experiencing some of the same problems.

It was called to our attention that we do not use "honorary professional" to describe our sorority. It is either one or the other. Honoraries are classed as societies and not sororities.

A report of the Professional Activities Committee consisted of a listing of the various professional activities of each member fraternity to the nation and community as well as to the fraternity. It was recommended that this type of report be kept up-to-date and put into printed form periodically in order to acquaint others of the good work being done by the professional fraternities for women.

The role played by the Professional Panhellenic Association in the Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council of which PPA is a member was discussed. IRAC is educational, informational, and advisory. It speaks with one voice for all college fraternities and works for study and improvement of the fraternity.

In addition to the business meetings that were held all day long, there was time for a bit of socializing. A trip was planned for conventioners to visit the Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum. Several very outstanding speakers were engaged to entertain and inform us at our meal functions. There was Helen Bower, drama critic of the Detroit Free Press who gave a hilarious talk on "What It Is Like To Be In The Movies" after having had the opportunity of appearing with Clark Gable in "The Teacher's Pet". A little more on the serious side, we heard Virginia Sink speak on "Peace and Atomic Energy". Also James Thompson, executive secretary of the Pro-

IN MEMORIAM



Cora Craven

Deep sorrow prevailed over us when death suddenly took Cora Craven from our midst. She died on Sunday, March 6, 1960 of a heart condition during an attack of pneumonia. She is buried in a little private family cemetery in North Pembroke, New Hampshire.

Cora was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts and lived there all of her life. Cora began the study of Pharmacy in the Fall of 1915 at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy. She was initiated into Lambda Kappa Sigma, when it was a local sorority. When the national sorority was organized, she was elected corresponding secretary. She also served two terms as president of the alumnae chapter at Boston. During the Chicago Convention of 1934 she was elected Member-at-Large.

After leaving the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy she worked at Macgowan's Drug Store in Lawrence until her retirement two years ago.

Her family, her church and her sorority were Cora's life.

Cora was one of the oldest and most loyal members of our sorority. She was one of our past national presidents who has done much to further the growth of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

She designed our seal in 1919 and then later it was adopted by the Grand Council as our National Seal. She designed our pledge pin, the badge and the honorary member pin.

At the time of her death she was an Honorary Adviser of Lambda Kappa Sigma.
