



Dr. Muriel Vincent Honored



Through the use of resins in the Ion-Exchange method of Chromatography, Dr. Muriel Vincent is able to break down amines or volatile oils into their various elements. Because of a different affinity each element has for the resin, they pass from the tube, above, to the bottle on the counter at various rates of speed.

Dr. Muriel Vincent, College of Pharmacy assistant dean, and chairman of the department of pharmacy at North Dakota State University, has been named by a faculty committee as recipient of the 11th annual Faculty Lectureship.

Dr. Vincent is the first woman named to the annual lectureship awarded by the NDSU faculty in recognition of distinguished academic achievements by one of its members.

The public lecture, traditionally delivered by recipients of the award, has been scheduled at 8 p.m., February 28, in the NDSU Memorial Union Ballroom.

Dr. Vincent's lecture, "Writing in Color," is based on a continuing research project in chromatography, which she has conducted since receiving her Ph.D. in that area from the University of Washington in 1955.

Chromatography includes five different methods of separating and identifying individual elements in various compounds. Dr. Vincent's research work is currently centered around separating allergy - producing elements from balsam and resin

compounds. Later, these elements will be administered to monkeys to determine the strength of their allergy-producing agents — the ultimate goal being some form of an antidote for allergies.

Dr. Vincent is in her 11th year of teaching at NDSU, and was appointed chairman of the department of pharmacy in 1958. She came to NDSU from Oregon State where she was an assistant professor of pharmacy. After being graduated from Oregon State with a bachelor's degree in 1944, Miss Vincent earned a master's degree in pharmaceutical chemistry at the University of Washington in 1951.

Since joining NDSU she has contributed articles to five professional journals on her work in chromatography, and has written a chapter on ion exchange, one form of chromatography, in a textbook published this summer. The textbook is in use at the University.

Dr. Vincent holds membership in the following honorary and professional groups: American Pharmaceutical Association; Society of Hospital Pharmacists; American Chemical Society; North Dakota Academy of Science; New York Academy of Sciences; American Association for the Advancement of Science; Sigma Xi, honorary science society; Phi Kappa Phi, national honorary scholastics society, Rho Chi, honorary pharmacy society; and Lambda Kappa Sigma, international pharmaceutical sorority.

She teaches the four graduate courses in chromatography and while she hasn't done a great deal of research lately herself, "I work with the graduate students and follow what they are doing."

While she no longer works with it, Dr. Vincent was responsible for setting up the two-year program of study in cosmetics which started at NDSU in 1963. The two-year program trains students in the knowledge of the contents of cosmetics and upon graduation they are ready for work in the sales portion of the cosmetic industry. To work in laboratories, the students would have to go into further study and a number who have started in the two-year program have continued into advanced study. A number of NDSU graduate students have positions with cosmetic firms.

Dr. Vincent does not minimize the difficulties of becoming a pharmacist. Each person on the College of Pharmacy faculty has between 20 and 30 undergraduates to advise and she has seen quite a number drop out or change their majors before the five-year requirement is completed.

"But it is a very excellent field for anyone interested in science and people, because you have to deal with the public." More women are becoming interested in pharmacy as a career, Dr. Vincent noted. There are 86 women in pharmacy at the University at present.

As for Dr. Vincent, she "kind of grew up in it," because her father was associated with drug stores as a buyer and had many friends among pharmacists.

She worked for several years as a pharmacist before she decided to go on for her doctorate so she has a personal knowledge of the business aspect of the subject as well as the academic.

Asked about the cost of drugs, Dr. Vincent said most prices are "actually very reasonable." This takes into consideration the "considerable research that goes into developing new drugs, the control procedures, to say nothing about distribution and sales expense."

She also points out that newly developed drugs can mean less time spent in a hospital and away from work which can be much more expensive than the price of a drug.

In addition to Dr. Vincent's membership in the groups connected with her profession, she has been active in a number of other organizations including Altrusa Club of Fargo a women's service club which she helped to organize in 1960 and served as president for two years, and the Fargo Branch of the American Association of University Women of which she is first vice president and has served as state chairman for the study subject, "Science, A Creative Discipline." She is vice president of Delta Kappa Gamma, an honorary group for women teachers.

Janice Sourwine Kenney Memorial Scholarship Established At Washington State University

Friends of Janice Sourwine Kenney will be pleased to know that a scholarship has been established in her honor at Washington State University. Janice, who graduated from WSU with the class of 1936, passed away June 28, 1966. Her husband, Mr. Frank J. Kenney of Portland, Oregon, has established the scholarship in memory of his wife. During her years at Washington State she was widely known for her many extracurricular activities, and was an outstanding student on the campus. She was very devoted to her chosen profession of pharmacy and loved her alma mater. She maintained a lifetime association with Washington State University and promoted its interests and welfare. She was a member of Mu Chapter.

The scholarship will be known as the Janice Sourwine Kenney Memorial Scholarship for Women Pharmacy Students. The income from the endowed fund will be used to provide a yearly scholarship to a woman student enrolled in the College of Pharmacy at Washington State University. Primary consideration will be given to students who have a demonstrated need for financial assistance in furthering their education. Care will also be exercised to choose women students for the award who exemplify the dedication of Mrs. Kenney to her alma mater and to her profession.

It is anticipated that the first scholarship will be awarded for the academic year of 1967-68.

Drugs and Pharmacy Pictured on Stamps

Have you ever heard of the "Pharmacopeia Philatelica"? It is the "coined" title of the main chapter of a new Handbook entitled **Drugs and Pharmacy on Stamps** by George B. Griffenhagen, Editor, **Journal of The American Pharmaceutical Association**, and published by the American Topical Association (8000-member philatelic organization dedicated to the collecting of postage stamps by subject).

The "Pharmacopoeia Philatelica" is an entirely new volume of materia medica, written in the interpretive language of postage stamps. More than 1,000 postage stamps are identified according to a modified **American Hospital Formulary Service** classification system. A glossary of therapeutic terms is included for the non-pharmacist collector, and a cross-index of drug names is added for quick and easy location of the drugs pictured on adhesives.

The new 96-page publication, which is the second in the American Topical Association medical handbook series, includes chapters on personalities connected with pharmacy pictured on stamps; drug dosage forms illustrated on stamps; pharmaceutical equipment and symbols on stamps; and drug advertisements printed on or as a part of postage stamps. A chapter is also devoted to the "private die proprietary medicine stamps" used during the Civil War and the Spanish American War.

The chapter on personalities connected with pharmacy was compiled by pharmacist Henryk Szaner of New York City, and the proprietary medicine stamps chapter was adapted from an article by Dean Varro E. Tyler of the School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences, Purdue University.

Other contributors to the Handbook include French pharmacist Pierre Julien, German pharmacist Walter Maiwald, and Swiss pharmacist Ernest Schlunegger. Twenty-one full page illustrations from the author's collection, as well as from various contributors, graphically portray the wide scope of collectible stamps which are associated with pharmacy.

The **Drugs and Pharmacy Handbook** is available at \$5.00 per copy from the American Topical Association, 3300 North 50th Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53216 (specify Handbook No. 55). The first volume of the Medical Handbook series entitled **Medical History in Philately**, 144 pages, by Gerhard J. Newerla, M.D. (Handbook No. 39) is also still available at \$6.00 or the two volume set can be purchased for \$9.00. A complimentary copy of **Topical Time** stamp journal accompanies all orders. The journal publishes frequent articles dealing with pharmacy on stamps and lists new stamps dealing with pharmacy and medicine.

Pharmacist Herbert Raubenheimer of Boston, Massachusetts recommended that "every pharmacist should have a hobby" when he introduced pharmaceutical philately to the profession 33-years ago. It is not too late to start your collection now — or to specialize if you are already a philatelist. The blueprint is contained in this new publication — so order your copy today.



All nine of our seniors are beginning to have one track minds . . . graduation! Good luck and our best wishes to all graduating Lambs!


