CALL TO CONVENTION




BULLETIN FROM CONVENTION CENTRAL

WESTERN REGIONAL MEETING, Northern Division

On a rainy Seattle day, January 13, 1968, Chi Collegiate Chapter hosted the first Western Regional Meeting, Northern Division of Lambda Kappa Sigma. The northwest chapters invited included Rho from Oregon State, Mu from Washington State, and Alpha Lambda from the University of British Columbia. Due to an unfortunate experience on the road, the representatives from Rho were unable to continue their journey and the flu bug bit the representative from Mu. But Alpha Lambda, Chi Alumnae and Chi Collegiate were well represented.

The girls began to arrive at the Student Union Building at the University of Washington about 9:00 a.m. The first item on the agenda was registration followed by an informal period in which we got acquainted and sipped coffee for early morning CNS stimulation! At 9:45 a.m. the meeting was officially called to order. The Official Prayer was recited. Carol Edmiston, president of Chi Chapter, welcomed the delegates and made the introductions.

Our Western Regional Supervisor, Rosemary Fox, began the discussion by explaining the meaning and purpose of regional meetings. She reminded us that they have much to offer in that they present the occasion for the discussion of problems and achievements and most importantly, for the exchange of ideas between chapters and the Grand Council. This year's new plan of having two separate meetings was undertaken in an attempt to allow more girls to attend. The Western Regional Meeting, Southern Division held this fall was very successful. Rosemary had many ideas to bring to us a result. She was especially impressed with the girls of Zeta who all have matching blazers and act as the official hostesses of the college — just one example of the role of regionals in the exchange of ideas. . . .

The first point of business was a look at chapter operations. Rosemary especially urged all officers to prepare a meaningful and complete annual report and organized notebooks for the in-coming officers. This is the only reference they will have many times in the future year when the graduate officer is far out of reach. We were also urged to take a good look at the Manual of Chapter Operations. This is a complete resume of procedures and is soon to be printed in a permanent form. Meanwhile, loose-leaf copies are available upon request from the Grand Secretary, Frances Curran.

Rosemary then gave us a short compilation of the activities of the other western chapters and turned the morning session over to Grand President, Pat Tanac.

Pat conducted a brief review of those things which should be contained in the chapter files. She gave a special emphasis to an explanation of the various cards, blue, salmon, etc., and their purpose and correct way of handling them. She again reminded us that all our official jewelry may be obtained from Balfour and a copy of their catalog should be in our files.

With the Twentieth Biennial Convention coming up this summer, Pat had several topics upon which she asked for our opinions and ideas. The first concerned the Cora E. Craven Educational Grants. The second topic was that of visitation by Grand Council members. At present, regional supervisors are reimbursed only for transportation costs to national conventions, as are the other Grand Council members. Therefore, any trips to regional meetings or just visits to individual chapters are at their own expense. She felt that if the regional supervisor was to effectively fill her role, she should be able to keep in contact with her chapters, but not at her own expense. She explained also that she felt it of utmost importance that the Grand President be more mobile. A visit from the Grand President is impressive and enhances sorority unity. Some means of making visitations possible as well as plausible for the Grand Council

member should be provided for in the constitution. We are to present this concept to our chapters for ideas and opinions.

The meeting was recessed at 11:30 a.m. We retired to a banquet room upstairs for a delicious luncheon and each received a large assortment of favors provided by Chi Alumnae Chapter.

The afternoon session was called order by Rosemary Fox. The delegates from each chapter presented their annual reports and discussion followed. After the session was adjourned, the visiting girls prepared for a shopping trip in the rain.

That evening, Chi Collegiate Chapter hosted a banquet in conjunction with its initiation of new members at the Windjammer Restaurant on Shilshole Bay. Before dinner, 15 girls were initiated in the traditional ceremony. We then sat down to a delicious dinner at tables decorated and full of surprises and gifts provided by Chi Alumnae Chapter. Pat Tanac spoke to us about her recent Eastern United States tour and visits to sister chapters. It sounded like a very valuable and fulfilling experience for Pat and especially for the girls. We closed the evening with a drawing for the many door prizes provided by our local merchants.

THE PILL*

The audience was mostly female. Some wore wedding bands, many did not. They ranged in age from about seventeen to well over forty. There were even a few mother-daughter teams, as well as two obvious mothers-to-be. They had all come to learn about the pill. "The Pill" a pharmacy seminar conducted by Lambda Kappa Sigma Sorority drew a large crowd.

Anti-fertility agents, or contraceptives, as they are more commonly known, are now used regularly by over 5 million American women, and the rate is steadily rising.

Yet contraceptive devices date back to 1550 B.C. Even the early Arab tribes experimented on camels. It was highly impractical for a camel to give birth on a long trip.

But because of increasing efficiency and availability of devices, as well as a changing moral attitude, contraception is more widely used and accepted.

Modern contraceptive research began in the early 40s, with experimental hormone injections, that interfered with the cycle, thus preventing ovulation and subsequent pregnancy. These injections were not only painful, but they were not successful over a long time period. Also, the pure hormone could not be taken orally.

Finally, a substitute compound was discovered and tested. It was finally put on the market in 1957. There are now 18 oral contraceptives, and most experts agree that it is the most effective anti-fertility agent, being effective 98% of the time. If "something goes wrong," it is usually because the woman has forgotten to take her pill, and not because of the compound itself. Even if she does "skip" one day, the woman is fairly safe if she takes the pill within 24 hours. In no case should she panic and take an overdose, since this can only upset the system further.

As for side-effects, these are almost negligible with recent products, all of which must maintain rigid standards set up by the Food and Drug Administration, according to Dr. Henry C. Wormser of the WSU College of Pharmacy. If a woman is susceptible to a bad reaction, the doctor can usually alter the dosage to fit her cycle.

One of the most common fallacies about oral contraceptives is that it affects the menopause cycle in a negative way. Although thorough studies of this are impossible at the present time (since the pill has not been on the market long enough) the only reaction reported so far were relief of the traditional ailments accompanying the onset of menopause, as well as an acceleration of that phase of the cycle, Dr. Wormser said.

Although there have been several experiments conducted with male hormones, extensive research in this area is difficult since men are not as cooperative in testing program as are women, perhaps because they do not bear the child. Also, in most cases where men were tested, there were indications of negative reactions.

Psychologically, the most drastic result of the pill is the fast declining birth rate, which has been decreasing steadily since the early 50s. This is despite the fact that the children born during the post-war baby boom are now at the production age. Also, the trend now in many societies is to push birth control as a moral responsibility to secure economic stability.

There are indications that the pill has had an effect on the relationships between married partners, observed Lucille Lantoni, a Planned Parenthood Association representative. The woman can no longer decline sexual activity on the grounds that she might get pregnant. This results in a more honest, as well as a more intimate relationship.

Further, sex is no longer simply a method of procreation, but a means of communication as well. Another result of the pill is the growing desire to discuss sex openly. Also, couples who do not wish to bear children are not as likely to feel intimidated, since marriages for companionship are more acceptable.

All of this indicates that the pill, or some means of contraception, has always been desired by society. "The Social Revolution" was simply a result of making them available to the general public.

THE 1967 I.P.S.F. CONGRESS

The 13th Congress of the International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation was held in Madrid, Spain, July 16-25, 1967. Nearly 200 students from 17 countries gathered on the campus at University City to discuss and compare Pharmacy of their respective countries and to learn the cultural background of the host country.

The first few days were spent touring Madrid and surrounding villages and visiting cultural sites including the Prado Museum, the Royal Palace, and Casa de Campo. A reception was given by the Dean of the Faculty (School) of Pharmacy; afterwards, we toured the School and its museum of historical pharmacy.

All day Tuesday was spent preparing for the General Assembly and the symposium on Pharmaceutical Education. On Wednesday, an excursion to the village of El Esorial started a long day; the students went through an old Monastery of historical interest; later, we ate lunch in a quaint Spanish "restaurant"; we boarded the buses to go to The Valley of the Fallen — a sacred valley honoring their dead; toward evening, a few brave members of the group tried the art of bullfighting at a Tienta; before departing for the residence hall, an international song festival was held.

Thursday, July 20th was the official opening of the Congress at the Delegacion Nacional de Sindicatos, a modern building in the heart of Madrid which was equipped for simultaneous translation into English, German, French, and Spanish. Annual reports were given by all the executive officers. Many topics were discussed including constitutional amendments, expansion of I.P.S.F. Programs, and individual problems in various countries. The General Assembly accepted the Malta Pharmaceutical Student Federation as a Full Member of I.P.S.F. and Delta Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Fraternity as a Member in Association. During the Symposium on the topic, "The Relationship of Education to Pharmacy as a Career", the United States participated in two sections.

At this Congress, election of new officers was held; Jane Turpin of London will serve as President for the next two years.

During our stay in Spain, we were guest at numerous receptions; at Cecillio Rodriguez Gardens, the Mayor of the city welcomed the Congress to Madrid; the President of the Spanish National Pharmaceutical Association spoke to the group about his organization and its history; Roche Laboratories gave a reception and a tour of their facilities for the Congress.

Night life was not lacking; our Spanish hosts kept us entertained every spare moment from the performance of the Flamencos, to a visit to the Festivals de Espana (Spanish dances, drama, and comedy), to a night on the lively, musical town.

During the week of the Congress, the temperature was the hottest in twenty years; Despite the heat, the students had an enjoyable and enlightening visit to Madrid. Before we realized it, the General Assemblies, Symposiums, and touring had come to an end, and it was time for the farewell dinner and ball held in the Luz Palacio Hotel. Although the Congress lasted only ten days, the friends, knowledge, and memories gained will last a life time.
