Many more Keys awarded

The criteria for awarding the Ethel J. Heath Scholarship were studied intensively by the Grand Council during the 1964-66 biennium. At the 1966 Convention in Stockton, California, the convention voted to change the educational requirements from "a 90% or better average" to "the top 10% of the graduating class." This standard allowed the members to be evaluated against the members of her own graduating class rather than attempting to equate the grading system of one college of pharmacy against another college of pharmacy. As a result of this change, more keys were awarded to more members, as indicated below:

1962 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The 17th Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma was held on June 24-28, 1962 in Boston, Massachusetts, the birthplace of Lambda Kappa Sigma. Since our 50th anniversary would fall on October 14, 1963, the hostesses, Alpha Collegiate and Alpha Alumnae Chapters, chose this convention to celebrate our Golden Jubilee. Julia Pishalski, Grand President, presided at the business sessions, with 155 persons in attendance. Also present were two of the charter members of Alpha Chapter, Mary Connolly Livingston and Annabel Carter Jones, who had also been the first Grand President of Lambda Kappa Sigma. Eight past Grand Presidents were in attendance.

The first Cora E. Craven Educational Grant of \$200.00, a Lambda Kappa Sigma national scholarship award, was presented at this convention to Nancy Stevens of Phi Chapter. The convention voted to increase the pledge fee from \$1 to \$2. It also recommended that a program of visitation to the chapters be instigated and that the program on Stray Lambs (Alumnae-at-Large Program) be further developed. Separate collegiate and alumnae conferences, as well as regional buzz sessions, were held.

Grand Council officers had the opportunity to visit the facilities of the L. G. Balfour Company in Attleboro to see the Preparation of the official Lambda Kappa Sigma jewelry, and were guests of the hostess chapter at the Boston Pops.

Sightseeing trips took delegates to Lexington, Concord, the Old North Bridge, along the route of Paul Revere, and past the homes of Longfellow, Lowell, Hawthorne, Emerson and Louisa May Alcott. Tours of the Schraft's candy plant and the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, where members were greeted by Dean Howard Newton, were included in the convention program.

A Hawaiian Luau was a highlight, with members dressed in muu-muus and given hula dance instructions. A contest was held to select the best-dressed member

and the best hula dancer. Alpha Beta chapters hosted a luncheon during the convention at the Yankee Fisherman, where members were joined by Dean and Mrs. Hewitt of the University of Connecticut and Dean and Mrs. Youngken of the University of Rhode Island.

The final dinner was an elegant affair, with champagne, a sumptuous dinner and the anniversary cake complete with sparklers. Each member attending was presented with a beautiful gold Paul Revere bowl. Presentations made after the dinner were:

1966 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The 19th Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma was the first to be held "on campus" at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California from August 13 to 18, 1966. Alpha Xi Collegiate Chapter acted as the hostess. Mary Gilbert, Grand President, presided at the business sessions, with 73 members in attendance, including six Past Grand Presidents.

New criteria were established for awarding the Ethel J. Heath Key, which will be given to members ranking in the highest ten-percentile of their graduating class. The national dues assessment was raised to five dollars per year, to include an annual subscription to the Blue and Gold Triangle. The national project of support for the SS HOPE was to be continued. In addition, two Cora E. Craven Educational Grants were to be given annually during the next biennium.

Social activities of the convention included a dinner at the home of Dean and Mrs. Rowland of the University of the Pacific, a trip to "gold rush" country, a tour of a local winery and informal activities on the campus of the University of the Pacific.

1964 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The 18th Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma was held in Memphis, Tennessee from June 21-25, 1964 at the Peabody Hotel. Alpha Epsilon Collegiate Chapter was the hostess of this convention, the first held in the south since the founding of Lambda Kappa Sigma 51 years before. Julia Pishalski, Grand President, presided at the business sessions which were attended by 30 chapter delegates in addition to other members, with 7 Grand Council members and 3 past Grand Presidents in attendance.

Items adopted at this convention were the preparation of a special membership certificate for Honorary Members and the establishment of a new category of membership, the Patron. The constitution

was revised and the Member-at-Large was given the additional job of writing up the biennial history and presenting it to the next convention. Members voted to make a contribution in addition to dues to the International Pharmaceutical Students Federation. It was recommended that a program of visitation to the chapters be further developed and that a chapter manual be prepared for the use of the chapters.

A recommendation was made that criteria for presentation of the Ethel J. Heath Honor Key be re-evaluated and a committee was appointed to present its recommendations at the next convention. It was voted that two Cora E. Craven Educational Grants of \$200.00 each would be offered annually during the biennium. Through an initial contribution of \$100.00

1968 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The 20th Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma was held from July 21 to 25, 1968 in Indianapolis, Indiana at the Marott Hotel. Phi Collegiate and Phi Alumnae chapters were hostesses for the convention. Pat Tanac, Grand President, presided over the business sessions which were attended by 34 chapter delegates, 9 Grand Council members, 3 Honorary Advisors, 9 past Grand Presidents and other members for a total attendance of 96.

At this convention, it was voted that the official name of the organization shall be Lambda Kappa Sigma International Fraternity for Women in Pharmacy. A new position of Fraternity Historian was created. The convention adopted changes in the Constitution and By-Laws which included: the allowance of air coach fare instead of train fare for convention travel, publication of five issues of the Blue and Gold Triangle per biennium instead of six, the deletion of the Grand Council office of Member-at-Large, the division of the Eastern region into two Provinces with a supervisor for each province and the awarding of additional Cora E. Craven Educational Grants to provide a total of three grants of \$200 each per year.

It was decided to publish a Ritual Book, to include the Founder's Day Ceremony, Pledging Ceremony, Initiation and Installation Rituals. Support for the SS HOPE as a national project was to be continued. Collegiate and alumnae conferences and regional buzz sessions were held.

The Ethel L. Herdlicka Memorial Fund, consisting of contributions made in honor of the late Grand Treasurer and Gamma Alumnae member, and amounting to \$478.00 was contributed to Lorraine Gribbens, also a Gamma Alumnae member, to use in her work as a pharmacist-missionary at Christ Hospital in Sarawak, Malaysia.

The convention theme was "Race Toward a Happening" and from the Luau Welcome Buffet Supper to the final elegant formal banquet, members raced through many interesting, informative and unusual happenings. These included tours of Eli Lilly and Company, Pitman-Moore Bio Labs, Hook's Antique Pharmacy at the Indiana State Fair Grounds, the Indianapolis Speedway and the Butler University campus and College of Pharmacy, with an especially memorable luncheon at the Indianapolis Country Club and a PPA luncheon with members of PPA fraternities in attendance.

1970 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The 21st Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma was held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania at the Marriott Hotel from July 26 to 30, 1970. Eta Collegiate and Eta Alumnae chapters were the hostesses, assisted by Alpha Alpha Collegiate chapter. There were 124 members registered at the convention: 38 chapter delegates, 9 Grand Council members and 5 past Grand Presidents, with Pat Tanac, Grand President, presiding at the business sessions.

At the first business session of the convention, Alpha Alpha Alumnae Chapter was installed by Adele Lowe, Grand Vice-President. The format of the constitution of the organization was revised so that the former Constitution and By-Laws were incorporated and presented under one form as the Constitution: provision was made for Alumnae chapter organization when 6 members reside in an area where there is no alumnae chapter: two new standing committees, the Memorials and Resolutions Committee and the History and Scrapbook Committee, were created: and the allowance of travel expenses for Grand Council officers to the regional meetings in their respective region was established.

Collegiate and alumnae conferences were held, as were regional buzz sessions for the selection of sites for the regional meetings. It was decided to hold an Interim Grand Council meeting one year after this convention to facilitate the fraternity operations.

The number of Cora E. Craven Educational Grants was increased to provide a total of 5 grants of \$200 each per year. The support of SS HOPE as a national project was continued with the contribution of \$500 from the national treasury in addition to the monies donated by the individual chapters. Chapters were encouraged to support Project CONCERN as a humanitarian service, and to conduct more programs to educate the public in the hazards of drug abuse during the biennium.

The theme of the convention was a "Philadelphia Fling", augmented by a separate theme for each day. The interest and work of the members nationally in drug abuse education had increased during the biennium, and the speech "Marijuana-Fact or Fiction" by Dr. G. Victor Rossi, Director of the Department of Biological Sciences at Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science, made many sisters more aware of this drug and its problems. While on the campus of PCP&S, members saw a demonstration of Eta Collegiate's sensational "Rush Party". Members of 7 PPA fraternities joined Lambs at the Professional Panhellenic luncheon to hear Mary Louise Anderson of Kappa Epsilon speak on "Women in Pharmacy". In spite of inclement weather, tours of the "City of Brotherly Love" and the U. S. Mint, and a splash party and buffet supper proceeded as planned, through the courtesy of Alpha Alpha Collegiate Chapter of Temple University. Patrons of Eta Chapter installed during the convention were Dr. Arthur Osol, President; Dr. Linwood F. Tice, Dean; and Mr. John E. Kramer, Vice-President and Registrar, all of the

The award was accepted for her by Elizabeth Raiman, Midwestern Regional Supervisor and president of Gamma Alumnae Chapter. The Ethel L. Herdlicka Memorial Fund containing a balance of \$38.92 was closed and this amount was donated to Lorraine Gribbens for use in her work.

1972 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The 22nd Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma was held from July 24 to 27, 1972 at the Bel Air East Motor Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri. The hostesses were Alpha Zeta Collegiate Chapter and the new Alpha Zeta Alumnae Chapter which was officially installed at the first business session of the convention by Mary Wills, Grand Vice President. Adele Lowe, Grand President, presided at the business sessions, which were attended by 109 members, including 30 chapter delegates, 9 Grand Council officers, 2 Honorary Advisors and 5 past Grand Presidents.

A revised Constitution was adopted at this convention, including; reinstatement of the office of Member-at-Large, with responsibility for the Alumnae-at-Large (Stray Lamb) program; an increase of national dues to \$7.00; the establishment of a Distinguished Service Citation for outstanding service to the fraternity by a member; and a new provision for Alumnae Initiates to alumnae membership.

While five Cora E. Craven Educational

Grants of \$200 each per year would continue to be awarded, a new grant was established - the Dr. B. Olive Cole Educational Grant of \$250.00, to be awarded each year of the biennium to an alumnae member engaged in graduate study and research. Two new standing committees were established; the Dr. B. Olive Cole Educational Grant Committee, to select the recipient of the new grant; and the Budget and Finance Committee, to advise the Grand Council on financial matters.

At this time it was decided that all publishing efforts would be combined in a new form of the Blue and Gold Triangle, published in tabloid style for greater economy, reading ease, improved distribution and the inclusion of more photographs. A new 50 year membership certificate was made available to the chapters for their members, as more than 300 women now held membership of 50 years or more.

As in many previous conventions, collegiate and alumnae conferences were held with the members of these groups exchanging ideas and discussing matters of common concern, and regional buzz sessions were held to select the sites of the next regional meetings.

The convention body affirmed its faith in Lambda Kappa Sigma as the strongest force for women in pharmacy, and expressed its concern for equality with a resolution that women be granted equal opportunity for professional advancement.

As the first Interim Grand Council meeting held during the past biennium had proven beneficial in expediting fraternity operations, it was decided to hold such a meeting again during the next biennium.

Following the convention theme of "Getting It Together", members did get together for pleasure as well as for business. Highlights were a tour of the Lewis Howe Laboratories, a tour of the sights of St. Louis arranged by members of the St. Louis Symphony Auxiliary and an evening at the Municipal Opera to see the production of "1776". Even a cloud-burst did not dampen spirits as a

Project HOPE

Project HOPE (Health Opportunity for People Everywhere) is an activity of the People-to-People Health Foundation, Inc., of Washington, D.C. The objective is to teach medical, dental and paramedical personnel in developing countries and certain domestic areas the latest techniques of U.S. medical science.

In 1960 the S.S. Hope made its first overseas missions to Indonesia and South Vietnam. In 1969 HOPE made its first domestic missions in a Navajo Indian reservation in Arizona and in the Mexican-American community of Laredo, Texas.

Margaret Sherwood (Delta) became a staff pharmacist on the S.S. Hope in 1962. Delegates at convention in 1964 voted the S.S. Hope as a national philanthropic project for Lambda Kappa Sigma for the Biennium and S.S. HOPE has been maintained ever since as our national philanthropy.

Collegiate chapters and Alumnae chapters have organized special fund raising activities and designated funds from chapter treasuries in support of Project HOPE. Through chapter efforts and individual contributions, Lambda Kappa Sigma has contributed over \$6500 to the work of the good ship HOPE.

Publications of Lambda Kappa Sigma

The Pledge Handbook was revised twice during the past ten years and is now in its fifth edition. The 28 page book with its bright yellow cover is the pledge's best friend.

The Manual for Chapter Operation evolved from a 10 page collection of forms through two mimeographed editions and on to two offset-printed editions which incorporate the Constitution within its covers. The compact Manual contains samples of all the forms needed to operate a chapter smoothly.

The Prospectus, a one page brochure noting highlights about the fraternity was updated and restyled. It is a handy "give-away" for rush parties, open house events and public relations mailings.

The Grand Council Guide is a mimeographed handbook prepared for the use of Grand Council officers and national committee members. The Ritual book was updated and all ceremonies were incorporated into one gold-covered book. Full directions and requisites for performing all ceremonies are included with the text. All chapters were given a set of Ritual books.

All the publications indicated above were revised by Frances Curran, with the concurrence of the Grand Council.

Program locates many Stray Lambs in decade

Triangle notes changes

The BLUE AND GOLD TRIANGLE has remained the main source of communication for the fraternity since 1926. It has reached, and continues to reach, all members of our fraternity: collegiates, alumnae and Stray Lambs. The TRIANGLE reports the activities of the chapters and published numerous articles of interest to all members. In the past ten years the BLUE AND GOLD TRIANGLE has undergone many changes, but it still maintains its original purpose: fraternal unification.

At the 1962 Convention in Boston, Massachusetts, Ursula Biermacher (Gamma) was elected Grand Editor and edited three issues while serving in that capacity. In September of 1963, a new Grand Editor was appointed to complete the unexpired term of Ursula Biermacher, who had resigned. Donna (Michael) Luchtman (Alpha Iota) was appointed to this position and she edited three issues during her appointment.

Donna Luchtman was elected by the 1964 Convention in Memphis, Tenn., enabling her to continue her very efficient job as Grand Editor. She continued in that capacity until 1972. During her term in office several changes occurred. At the 1966 Convention in Stockton, California, the delegates approved the raising of national dues assessments to five dollars per year per member, which included an annual subscription to the BLUE AND GOLD TRIANGLE. In 1968, the delegates changed publication of the TRIANGLE from six issues per biennium to five issues. In 1970, the cover was changed from gold to blue.

At the 1972 Convention in St. Louis, Missouri, Pamela Ehlers (Alpha Zeta) was elected Grand Editor, and is presently serving in that capacity. Due to the increasing cost of printing, postage, and time, the BLUE AND GOLD TRIANGLE was changed to a newspaper format, and the number of issues per biennium increased. In order to achieve more with the money we spent on publications, the BLUE AND GOLD TRIANGLE also included the "Lamb's Tales" column by the Grand Secretary, "A-Lamnae News" column by the Grand Vice-President and "Alumnae-At-Large" column by the Member-At-Large. It was decided that the Grand Editor would no longer be scoring for the Efficiency Cup and Gavel; all her efforts would be directed toward publication of the TRIANGLE. By obtaining a Non-Profit Organization Postage approval, the TRIANGLE was able to reach more sisters at a lower cost. The new format of the BLUE AND GOLD TRIANGLE was not only designed to decrease expenses, but also to increase the varied types of articles to interest all sisters: collegiate, alumnae, and Stray Lambs.

TEN YEARS OF EFFICIENCY SCORING

Lambda Kappa Sigma stresses and recognizes individual and chapter achievement. Our two highest awards for chapter excellence are the Efficiency Cup awarded to the most proficient Collegiate Chapter and the Efficiency Gavel given to the outstanding Alumnae Chapter at each biennial convention. (These awards by the Grand Council are based on a scoring system adopted by the fraternity.)

The criteria for these awards remained the same from about 1960 until 1970 when Grand Council decided that the requirements should be reviewed by a committee and submitted to the delegates at the 1972 Convention. Grand Council also decided at the biennial meeting in Philadelphia to award two efficiency certificates to the first and second runner-up Collegiate Chapters. This was done to give some recognition to the chapters who were doing fine jobs and were only a point or two away from "The Cup."

Donna Luchtman was chairman of this committee and she attended all Regional Meetings in 1971 where the scoring was a major topic. Many suggestions were offered by chapters and Grand Council. The topic was discussed at the meeting in St. Louis. As a result, less emphasis is now placed on deadlines and more emphasis is stressed on chapter activities and achievements. The regional supervisors and the Grand Vice President have the greatest responsibility in scoring the chapters because they have the closest contact with the chapters. Chapters who win the Cup or Gavel three times retain the award permanently. Chi Collegiate Chapter has won the Efficiency Cup 5 times, Phi Alumnae Chapter has won the Gavel four times and Chi Alumnae Chapter has won the Gavel 3 times.

She subsequently served as an assistant editor for several years. Ethel was graduated from the University of Illinois, College of Pharmacy in 1927, and since that time was an active member of Gamma Alumnae Chapter, serving as president in 1932 and later as treasurer.

In 1932 she represented her chapter as delegate at the Fourth Biennial Convention in Philadelphia. In 1956, at the 14th Biennial Convention held in Chicago, Ethel was elected Grand Treasurer. She served us devotedly in that capacity until her death.

Ethel practiced retail pharmacy in Chicago in her father's drug store, until his death and for some time thereafter, until shortly before her death.

We were all warmed by her personal charm and inspired by her vital interest in the growth and achievements of Lambda Kappa Sigma. This gifted, devoted past national officer has left us a great legacy.

CHERYL SUHOZA KENNEDY, Tau Alumnae, graduated from Duquesne University School of Pharmacy. She was the first Grand Council officer to hold the office of Eastern Regional Supervisor of Province I after the Region was divided into two provinces.

ADELE LOWE, Grand President (1970-1974), 2nd Vice-President (1948-50), 4th Vice-President (1950-54), Southern Regional Supervisor (1958-60), Midwestern Regional Supervisor (1966-68), Grand Vice-President (1968-70); was graduated from the Indianapolis College of Pharmacy (now Butler University) with the degree of B.Sc. in Pharmacy. While in college, she was secretary of her class for 3 years and vice-president for one year. Adele was initiated into Lambda Kappa Sigma through Phi Collegiate Chapter and is a charter member of both Phi Collegiate and Phi Alumnae Chapters. As a collegiate member she served in several offices; and as a member of the alumnae chapter she again served in many offices, including that of the First President of the newly-founded chapter. She represented LKS at the commemorative ceremonies for the First Day of Issue of the Pharmacy Stamp in November, 1972, and she is one of two LKS official representatives to the 1973 national Professional Panhellenic Ass'n Convention.

Adele has attended every convention since 1940, except two; and she has served in the capacities of Convention Chairman for the 1950 national convention and on the coordinating committee for the 1968 national convention.

Rosetta is now serving a three year term on the board of Governors of Duquesne University. She is also a member of the Penna. Pharmaceutical Assoc. and the APhA. CHAPTERS REPORT OF PAST TEN YEARS



ALPHA CHAPTER

The history of Lambda Kappa Sigma from 1913-1918 belongs to Alpha chapter's archives, since it was the mother chapter up until 1918 when another chapter was added and Lambda Kappa Sigma was well on its way to becoming an international fraternity. The first charter members were: Anabel Carter Jones, Mary Connolly Livingston, Emma McDonnell Cronin, Willette McKeever Cheever, Alice Garner Coleman, Margaret Magdalene Curran, Mary Durgin Loveland, Rosamond A. Quinn, and Ethel J. Heath, the founder.

Since its birth in 1913, this chapter has initiated over 450 women. The members are always striving to keep up the enthusiasm and fraternal love of the chapter, and maintain the ideas and ideals that were the basis of its founding. The chapter continuously works toward new and better goals through contributions to the profession, fraternity, and community. This chapter has entertained at three conventions, the very first national Lambda Kappa Sigma Convention in 1926, the Silver Jubilee Convention in 1938, and the Golden Jubilee Convention in 1962. In addition, they were hostesses to Eastern Regional meetings held in 1943, 1951, 1967 and in 1973. In 1956 they won the Efficiency Cup. That same year they published a Recipe Book which fared very well. There has been many Ethel J. Heath Key winners.

Alpha chapter is always working to achieve high scholastic standards, and each year there are members who qualify for election to Rho Chi Honor Society. Most members work in pharmacies throughout New England, and are always contributing their part to improve the pharmaceutical profession and professional relationship with others.

We are honored to have a past Grand President, Ruth Flaherty, who is also a 50 year member. In 1973, Mr. Maurice V. Foley was inducted as a Patron.

Many of the chapter activities have included dances, silver teas, bowling parties, educational trips, and gatherings with other chapters. In the near future the activities will include tie making parties, raffles for Project HOPE, Submarine Sandwich Sales, and many inter-fraternal and brotherly love activities which is so lacking in today's society.

Alpha chapter was hostess for the 1973 Eastern Regional and looks with great hope and expectation towards the future of Lambda Kappa Sigma and Pharmacy as a profession.

BETA CHAPTER

Beta chapter was founded on April 11, 1918, when only two charter members, Mildred C. Preston and Madilyn De Marsh, junior students at the Albany College of Pharmacy Union University in Albany, New York, pledged themselves to Lambda Kappa Sigma, saying "great things have small beginnings." The beginning didn't remain small. The next fall so many girls entered the college that the membership totaled thirteen. Ten years later the membership doubled in size to twenty-six. In 1938 there were very few girls enrolled in Albany College of Pharmacy and as a result Beta Chapter had to find a new beginning with only a membership of two. From 1938 there has been a steady rise in membership and at the present Beta Chapter has initiated 436 members.

Since 1967 there have been 14 winners of the Ethel J. Heath Scholarship Key. In 1972 there was a record set for the largest number of recipients named from one class. That year Beta Chapter had six.

In 1968 Beta Chapter celebrated its 50th anniversary with numerous social functions. Many other activities throughout the years have become traditional but there is always room for flexibility. The sisters join with the Student Council to work at Freshman Orientation Day. Later in October the sisters serve as guides during the college's Open House program. For new women students, the chapter hosts a Get Acquainted Party early in the school year. Other activities include a Faculty Buffet, Parent-Daughter Dinner, Rush Party for prospective members, Closed Weekend, and finally the Senior Party in the spring.

Service projects are arranged on a seasonal basis. The Christmas services involve donations to St. Colman's Home, donations to the needy aged through local agencies and caroling at community nursing homes. Also at this time money donations are given to Project HOPE and to a local free clinic. During the pledge period visits are made to the St. Catherine Home for Children.

Beta Chapter sponsors many money-making projects throughout the year. At the beginning of the year the Chapter

organizes a mixer and raffle for the entire school. In the fall the sisters have a sweatshirt and mug sale which is most appealing to the first year students. Again during pledging the sisters put on a spaghetti supper which everyone enjoys. In the spring the sisters sponsor a car wash which is a lot of work but also a lot of fun. Bake sales are arranged several times throughout the year. New ideas are gathering for the future and will be added to the traditional functions.

Beta Chapter was honored to name Mrs. Ruth Roberts as patron to our Chapter on May 11, 1971. Mrs. Roberts retired in the spring of 1973, after serving many years, not only as secretary to our Dean, but as close friend and advisor to the sisters of Beta.

ETA CHAPTER

Eta has been the largest Chapter in Lambda Kappa Sigma since their installation in 1920.

From 1963 to the present Eta Chapter has initiated 127 sisters. Two Honorary members were inducted into Eta; On October 12, 1967, Dr. Susan H. Joshi, Associate Professor of Biology, and on May 12, 1969, Dr. Lena DeLisser-Matthews, Professor of Chemistry. The chapter has inducted four Patrons. On April 25, 1968 Dr. G. Victor Rossi, director of the Department of Biological Sciences, and during the summer of 1970 at the Biennial Convention held in Philadelphia three more Patrons were inducted; Dr. Arthur Osol, President; Dr. Linwood Tice, Dean and Mr. John E. Kramer, Vice President and Registrar of the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science.

Eta has displayed a great deal of active participation in every aspect of college life, community welfare and professional interest. Eta has been awarded the Student Government Scholastic Cup for obtaining the highest average of any other fraternity on campus for eight years since 1963.

Eta has awarded 23 Ethel J. Heath Keys and received 5 Cora E. Craven Educational Grants. Eta has represented the United States and Lambda in Vienna, Pakistan, Austria, Denmark, Israel and Paris, as participants in the International Pharmaceutical Students Federation since 1963. Every year Eta has had an Editor or Co-Editor of the college newspaper and yearbook. The sisters have displayed excellent leadership as officers and representatives in Student Government, Dormitory Council, Rho Chi, and SAPHa. Eta sisters are avid participants on intramural and intermural sport teams at the college along with various club memberships.

Each year Eta sisters have represented fraternities on campus as their Sweethearts and since 1963 five sisters have held the title of "College Queen".

Eta sisters have several annual affairs which have become traditional, to promote the ideals of the fraternity to others. Commencing each school year we host a Freshman Tea; an introduction of Fraternity and College life to freshman. Two rush parties are held to attract possible initiates. A parents day is organized in the middle of the school year, and a Senior Dinner is held to honor our graduating sisters. Ravioli and spaghetti dinners are held to strengthen the bonds with our fraternal brothers of Kappa Psi.

Numerous sisters have been included in "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities".

Several fund raising projects are held to assist in supporting Eta Chapter financially. Those projects include the sale of candy, bake sales, car washes, raffles and the Fraternity Review. S.S. HOPE is our major program which we support financially on an annual basis.

Our professional projects have been quite extensive within the past ten years. Eta has been involved with a "Drug Sorting Project" in conjunction with the University of Pennsylvania Hospital. These drugs are sent to missions and underprivileged countries. We received wide recognition within the community and received a plaque as a token of the community's appreciation. Eta sisters visited orphanages and collected toys for their distribution.

Eta has been involved in Telethons, Blood Drives and Cancer Projects. To have each pledge thoroughly involved with the fraternity's professional concerns we ask every pledge class to participate in a professional project entirely organized by them and approved by the sisters. Symposiums have been organized by the Alumnae and Collegiate Chapters which help to strengthen communications. Slide presentations and speakers have been organized by the collegiate chapter to

involve other members of the campus community.

In 1967 Eta received the Head of Hygeia from an Eta Alum residing in Greece; Dr. Nina Sideri.

The 1970 Biennial Convention was hosted by Eta Chapter. At this time an Eta sister was named "Miss Personality". The Chapter received Honorary Mention for the Efficiency Cup.

In 1972 Eta Chapter received the Efficiency Cup.

Whether Eta hosted the convention or not the attendance of Eta Collegiate at each convention has been overwhelming.

Several Grand Council Officers have been elected were from Eta Chapter:

In 1964 Frances Curran (Eastern Regional Supervisor); 1966 Frances Curran (Grand Secretary); Polly McDowell (Eastern Regional Supervisor); 1968 Polly McDowell (Eastern Regional Supervisor); Frances Curran (Grand Secretary); 1970 Frances Curran (Grand Secretary, Mary Wills (Grand Vice President), Marie Tice (Eastern Regional Supervisor II); 1972 Frances Curran (Grand Secretary), Mary Wills (Member-at-Large), Marian Ricardo (Eastern Regional Supervisor II).

Eta Chapter is continuously striving to perfect the ideals we believe in, but most of all to serve the fraternity, the community and the profession to our utmost.

LAMBDA CHAPTER

Mickey Mouse is looking forward to helping the girls of the Lambda chapter host the 1974 Biennial Convention. The history of the Lambda chapter began in 1921 on the campus of the University of Southern California at Los Angeles. Since that time the chapter has initiated 264 girls. Many have been the recipients of the Ethel J. Heath Key, as well as the Cora E. Craven Educational Grant. Some of our girls have been tapped for Rho Chi. Others in our chapter are active in the Student American Pharmaceutical Association, and the California Pharmaceutical Association.

Each year the girls sell lab coats as the prime money maker for the chapter. Pharmacy patches are also sold and sewn on the coats for a small fee. Monthly bake sales are held featuring either cookies, cupcakes or brownies. Candy apples are sold at the University's Open House held in the Spring.

Founder's Day is celebrated with a guest speaker. Pledging is usually in the fall, beginning with a luncheon for the new freshman, so that they can meet the faculty and active members. There are exchanges with the men's pharmacy fraternities such as ice skating with Phi Delta Chi or a sports night with Rho Pi Phi and Alpha Iota Phi. Our Annual Dinner Dance is held in February or March followed by a professional dinner in late spring to recognize Hygeia Day.

As in 1952 when this chapter hosted the national convention, the girls are presently hard at work on the Biennial Convention to be held in July 1974.

MU CHAPTER

Joan Rohrbach, elected President in 1962, represented our chapter at the Regional Meeting held in Portland, Oregon that same year. Our other delegates to the various conventions - Marti Lee, the National Convention held in Philadelphia in April of 1970 - have brought back interesting and informative details of the affairs. These reports aided our chapter in planning and preparing for the Northwestern Regional Meeting held in Pullman in February of 1971 for which we were given the honor of hosting.

Mu Chapter is proud of the fact that it still has available a \$25.00 scholarship to be awarded to a junior girl with the highest grade point. In 1963 a new \$75.00 scholarship for a deserving girl in pharmacy to be chosen by the faculty was founded. In the past years this scholarship has been altered. Although it is still for the same amount, it is now awarded to an outstanding fifth-year girl in pharmacy. Since these two scholarships were founded they have been awarded to a number of deserving girls.

We are also very proud of our members for many of them have received recognition in being nominated or chosen for several distinguished awards. Janet Foster, in 1964, received the Ethel J. Heath Key and later in 1970 was nominated for the Award of Merit from the graduating class of 1964. In 1967 and 1970 other members of our chapter were nominated for the Ethel J. Heath Key.

Since our chapter was founded, it has had many fund-raising projects. Our major project is the selling of lab jackets to the other pharmacy students. We have also engaged in selling other items to

dormitories and sororities, held bake sales and have had in the past held candy sales. We are always trying to find new ways in which raise funds for our chapter for its various projects and activities.

In 1967, it was first decided to pledge five dollars to the S.S. HOPE. Since its establishment six years ago, this pledge has become an annual event.

Our chapter has both formal and informal gatherings throughout the year. Its annual Christmas party for the faculty and their children has proven to be a great success in past years and we hope in future years. There are also many informal gatherings held to aid in pledging new girls into our chapter. The past eleven years have been very rewarding to many of the girls who have been members of our chapter. We hope we will have many future, successful years.

NU CHAPTER

Nu chapter was chartered by Lucille Winkler, then president of Theta chapter, at Highland Park College of Pharmacy on April 24, 1925. The college was transferred to Des Moines College of Pharmacy in 1928, and on January 9 of that year a new charter was granted. In 1939 the college again transferred, this time to Drake University.

Nu chapter has had two Grand Council members. Doris Carmody (member-at-large 1938-40) and Winnifred Mote (Southern Regional Supervisor 1960-62).

Peg Granberg, Jewell Snider, and Clara Zeller are Patrons of the chapter, and Sue Lutz is the advisor.

Nu chapter's 25th anniversary was observed in 1950 with a tea. A large map of the U. S. showing the location of LKS chapters was displayed with the charter.

There have been approximately 15 Heath Key recipients since 1960.

In 1960 Nu chapter received the Efficiency Cup for most outstanding collegiate chapter during a previous biennium.

Since issuance of the charter 215 women have become active members of the chapter.

In 1959 and 1967 Nu chapter hosted the Midwestern Regional Meeting. In addition, there has been involvement in Post Graduate Seminars, SAPHa meetings, County Association conferences, and VD symposiums.

For years the chapter's fund raising projects have been donut sales and a Christmas bake sale.

Professional activities include working with the Women's Auxiliary to the Polk County Pharmaceutical Association, collecting funds for the Cancer Foundation, and distributing information for the Epilepsy Foundation. Each year LKS and Kappa Psi instruct grade-schoolers in poison prevention. At present the women are working with Kappa Psi to establish VD education in junior high schools.

In 1965 Omicron was proud to have listed Mary Aboud Murray and Johanna Poprazan as "Outstanding Young Women in America".

Omicron chapter has helped in many activities within the college including hostesses of the Pre-Pharmacy Reception, Stephen Wilson Seminar and Region IV's Student American Pharmaceutical Association (SAPhA). Many members have served in office and also played an active part in SAPhA, SAB, SFC, as well as attending the regional meetings and working on our own Wayne Pharmic, an official publication of W.S.U. College of Pharmacy, written by, for, and about Pharmacy students and graduates. Fund raising projects include bake sales, raffles, selling of Pharmacy Decals and road rallies.

July, 1968 brought the 20th Biennial Convention in Indianapolis. Rosemary Lu Bonnette acted as delegate and Virginia Budden as Alumnae representative. A Silver 25 year Certificate was presented to Omicron Alumnae. R. Bonnette was also the recipient of the Ethel J. Heath Key and Nancy Merrell received one in 1970, Karen Bohorski received a service award.

In 1969 Frances Ptak and Carolyn Kalczyński attended the Midwestern Regional Meeting at Ferris State College. Sister Emmanuel Schott was approved by the Grand Council as an Honorary Member to Omicron Chapter. A Lambda Kappa Sigma Recognition Key was brought into being by Omicron Chapter and is presented to a graduating fraternity member who displays distinguished service to the fraternity and college and is in good standing.

In December of 1970, Omicron Chapter had the pleasure of entertaining Adele Lowe, Grand President, Donna Luchtman Grand Editor 1970-72 and Julia Pishalski at a dinner for the initiation of our pledges. Founder's Day was celebrated this year in Toledo with Alpha Mu as hosts. We had nine members of Omicron Chapter in attendance. This year \$60.00 was contributed to S.S. HOPE, our largest amount yet.

Beverly Galuska received the Ethel J. Heath Key in 1971. Barbara Malek was the recipient of the Alumnae Educational Grant in 1972. Our latest activities for Founder's Day and Hygeia Day have consisted of celebrating with Omicron Alumnae and also a dinner and speech by the Detroit Police Department Pharmacist, "The Drug Problem in and Around Detroit and What Can Be Done".

As a pledge project 1972-1973, a showcase was prepared in the University Center Building displaying "Women in Pharmacy". Omicron Collegiate has adopted the Sara Fisher and St. Vincent Home for Children as a special project showing our concern to those children who do not have families to share their Easter and Christmas holidays. Twice a year the fraternity has a bake sale to raise funds for its projects and to help pledges with their initiation fees. In addition to this the fraternity occasionally has a candy or hoagie sale.

Many of the members are active in the S.A.Ph.A. Deborah Storzski, Alpha Alpha chapter president, is the secretary for the S.A.Ph.A. Three members attended the S.A.Ph.A. convention this summer in Boston.

In 1964 the chapter was awarded the Efficiency Cup. The Chapter has had 7 members win the Ethel J. Heath Scholarship Key in the last four years. Many of the members of the chapter are members and officers in the Rho Chi Honor Society.

Lamb's Tales, the chapter's newsletter, is published twice a year to keep both the present members and alumnae informed on current fraternity events.

ALPHA/ZETA CHAPTER

During 1963 to 1965 the chapter was active locally, but not very active nationally. Over the past 10 years, the chapter initiated 47 new members and contributed \$240.00 to Project HOPE. The chapter also contributed \$807.42 to other causes such as TB, Pearl S. Buck Foundation, and Muscular Dystrophy. There were 3 Cora E. Craven recipients: in 1966, Janet Posenuk Tucker; 1969, Jeannine Keltner and 1970, Keven Lynch. There were also 7 Ethel J. Heath Keys awarded during this time.

In 1965 a very active member, Donna Neff, was killed in an automobile accident. Following this the chapter renamed its scholarship, the Donna Neff Memorial Scholarship.

In 1972 Alpha Zeta chapter was hostess for the biennial convention in St. Louis. At this convention Alpha Zeta Alumnae Chapter was officially installed and participated in its first convention. The chapter also contributed 2 new members to the Grand Council; Pam Ehlers, Grand Editor and Mrs. Marilyn Haberle, Southern Regional Supervisor; Miss Personality of the 1972 Convention was Keven Lynch. The chapter also received recognition as 2nd Runner-Up for the Efficiency Cup.

Some of the professional projects of the chapter are: sorting drugs at Kendrick Seminary to be sent overseas to missions, an adopted grandmother program at a St. Louis nursing home, "Drug of the Week" board at the College, Poison Prevention Poster Contest during Poison Prevention Week as well as a telephone reminder on household poisons with several St. Louis families, helping in a month long drive in St. Louis for Muscular Dystrophy in which all St. Louis fraternities and sororities participated, supplying the pharmacy in Pruitt Igoe with drugs, books and equipment, collecting Betty Crocker coupons to help purchase a kidney machine.

Fund raising projects consisted of selling T-shirts and sweatshirts to the student body, bagel and bake sales at the college, car washes, carnation sales on Valentine's Day and shamrock sales on St. Patrick's Day, selling birthday cakes and delivering to dorm students, a flea market, bottle drive, selling candles and greeting cards and card parties.

There are also several social activities such as helping with registration at the College, giving tours to prospective students and parents, Christmas party and tree decorating party at a St. Louis Nursinghome, and a shower for mental patients at State Mental Hospital.

ALPHA THETA CHAPTER, the thirty-first collegiate chapter of Lambda Kappa Sigma, was installed on March 23, 1952. During the first ten years of its existence the chapter participated in the development of the University of Buffalo campus and saw the School of Pharmacy move into a new Health Science Building in the fall of 1961.

The beginning of Alpha Theta's second decade saw the University of Buffalo change its status to become the State University of New York at Buffalo. Currently, a new campus is under

construction a few miles north of the present location. Hopefully the School of Pharmacy will be moving there in a year or so. The new building will offer expanded facilities and space for a greater educational experience.

The chapter continues to help with school functions, such as the annual back-to-school picnic in the fall, the school wide dance in January, and Open House for the community in the spring. We provide refreshments, decorations and any miscellaneous help needed. The proceeds from Alpha Theta's principal fund-raising project, a weekly baked goods sale, are donated to the S.S. Hope. Professional programs of interest to the school are sponsored when possible. The chapter also commemorates Hygeia Day and Founder's Day.

Over the past ten years 79 new members have been initiated into Alpha Theta Chapter. Unfortunately our Alumnae chapter is now in-active.

This chapter sponsored the Eastern Regional Meeting October 10, 11, 12, 1969 at the Statler-Hilton Hotel in Buffalo, New York.

We of Alpha Theta Chapter were extremely proud to have three recipients of the Ethel J. Heath Key in the 1973 graduating class. They were: Marcia Abrams, Barbara Gehr, and Patricia McDonnell.

ALPHA KAPPA CHAPTER

In the fall of 1963, Alpha Kappa Chapter, located at the University of Georgia School of Pharmacy at Athens, Georgia, was active for the first time in two years. At this time, the chapter had a fresh start in the Pharmacy School's new building and began to rebuild an active membership.

In 1965, the chapter first served as registrars and hostesses for the Pharmacy School's Open House. The Award to the Outstanding Senior Woman in Pharmacy School in 1966-67 was awarded to Janet Bellflower, Past President of Alpha Kappa Chapter.

Several awards went to Alpha Kappa members in 1968-69. The James A. Redfearn Award and the Atlanta Drug and Chemical Award went to Janis Phillips. Jane Wong received the I. Z. Sandy Thompson was SAPhA special projects chairman. Several Alpha Kappa members were award winners: Phyllis Parks won the LKS Award, both Audrey Herzberg and Jane Wong were awarded the National Public Education Award, Audrey Herzberg was awarded the Rexall Trophy, and Jane Wong was recipient of both the Lilly Achievement Award and the Dean's Award.

During the summer of 1970, our president-elect, Sandy Thompson, was a delegate to the 21st biennial convention of LKS in Philadelphia. Sandy was also Rho Chi secretary during 1970-71.

The highlight of the year '71-72 for Alpha Kappa Chapter was the Southern Regional Meeting. We served as hostess chapter for the meeting, which was held in Athens on October 29-30, 1971.

During the summer of 1972, Vicki White and Sammee Smith attended the LKS convention in St. Louis.

In this past year, 1972-73, we upheld our traditions of selling OTC handbooks, selling senior dispensing lab forms, and serving as hostesses for Open House. We sponsored a mixer at Christmas with Phi Delta Chi and Kappa Psi. We decorated a Christmas tree and "exchanged" gifts which were contributed to Central State Hospital in Milledgeville.

Our most successful project for the year was our First Annual "Ms. Apothe-hairy" Contest. Lovely contestants from the male segment of the student body and faculty were presented and the winner, Dolly (Assistant Dean Durward) Entekin, was crowned by Dean Kenneth Waters. The contest was a big success, as the proceeds went toward our largest contribution to SS HOPE in our history.

Sammee Smith served as 1972-73 SAPhA internal vice-president. Sammee, Vicki White, and Jan Pack attended the GPhA Convention in Macon, Georgia. Our Most Outstanding Sister Award went to our president, Vicki White. Jo Bandy received the Most Outstanding Senior Woman Award. Kathy Collier and Anita Richardson were recipients of the Merck, Sharp and Dohme Award. We inducted our first patron, Mr. C.P. Brackett, to show our appreciation for his help with and support for many of our projects.

Alpha Kappa Chapter has initiated 166 members since it was chartered. Recipients of the Ethel J. Heath Key include: Ann Marie Riley (1966), H. Whitney Bunting (1967), Martha Jane Booth and

Katherine Kidd (1968), Janis Phillips and Audrey Smith (1969), Jane Wong, Audrey Herzberg, Mary Louise Lane, and Sara Ann Cronan (1970), Linda Day Clifton and Sandra Thompson (1971), and Katherine Collier (1973). Our Cora Craven Scholarship winners were Ann Courter and Gail Bobbitt.

The coming year promises to be the best ever for Alpha Kappa Chapter. Miriam Hunter has been elected president of Rho Chi. Our new president, Sammee Smith (now Mrs. Steve Elerbee) is also president of SAPHa. These two are the first women presidents of these organizations at the University of Georgia and we are very proud of both of them. We have a large membership, lots of plans for projects and activities, and plenty of LKS enthusiasm.

As a result, a donation of \$50 was made to project HOPE.

ALPHA NU CHAPTER

Alpha Nu, the thirty-fifth collegiate chapter of Lambda Kappa Sigma was installed at the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy at Lexington, Kentucky on December 6, 1958 by the Grand President, Julia Pishalski. In 1964, however, due to the lack of girls in the college, the chapter went inactive. During the period of inactivation a local organization, the Ring of Hygeia, was formed. The Ring of Hygeia had activities and service projects similar to LKS, a few being Poison Prevention Week, parties for children at hospitals, and National Pharmacy Week.

The Alpha Nu chapter was reactivated in the centennial year of the college. On September 27, 1970 Judy Owens, Southern Regional Supervisor, pledged twenty-three girls. The pledging ceremony was held at the apartment of the president, Ann Patterson. On October 25, 1970 Judy Owens and Judy Riffie, Grand Treasurer, traveled to Lexington and were joined by Betty Hart, former Southern Regional Supervisor. A reception followed the initiation ceremony. Attending the reception were faculty and officers of Kappa Psi, Phi Delta Chi, and SAPHa. Three charter members of the chapter; Patricia Fullerton Harris, Patricia Anne Donahue, and Laura Webb Stone, also

attended.

During the remainder of the 1970-71 school year there were several service projects and a fund raising project. The money making project was to test OTC cold capsules for side effects at the rate of \$10 per person. On Halloween, children at the Medical Center were entertained with a party and given treats. For Christmas a tree was decorated in front of the pharmacy school and members helped the Phi Delta Chi's with a party for the handicapped children at Cardinal Hill Hospital. During finals week, survival kits were made for third year girls. After Christmas, rush began. Rush parties included a bowling party, wiener roast, and a Mexican party. On January 31, 1971 eleven girls were pledged--100% of the third year girls! The ceremony was held at the home of the fraternity advisors, Professor and Mrs. Doughty. Again our regional supervisor, Mrs. Judy Owens attended. At a spring banquet the eleven girls were initiated.

Alpha Nu had two members that were Heath Key recipients for the 70-71 school year. Contribution to SS HOPE was \$25.

The 1971-72 school year started out with rush. Three rush functions were: a cookout, miniature golf, and a trip to Danville, Kentucky to tour the Ephraim McDowell House and Apothecary Shop, followed by a picnic at Fort Harrod in Harrodsburg. The biggest function was a Hawaiian Luau, at which the girls tried their hand at preparing Hawaiian food. Attending the function were not only prospective members, but also the whole pharmacy school. On October 10, twenty-eight girls were pledged at a buffet dinner held at the pharmacy school.

As a service project, members in the chapter answered phones for the Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy Telethon. Others were Thanksgiving baskets and also a \$50 donation to the Funds for Fun Telethon for recreation for children in the hospitals of Lexington. A contribution of \$25 was made to SS HOPE.

University of Kentucky hosted the Region 4 SAPHa convention on October 21-24. Alpha Nu hosted a breakfast on Saturday October 24 for all the sister Lambies attending the convention.

The chapter had as fund raising projects selling sandwiches to students at lunch time and a raffle for a gift certificate. The chapter had programs in grade schools in the Lexington area on poison prevention during Poison Prevention Week.

Twenty pledges were initiated at a ceremony on February 15 in the President's Room at the Student Center. On May 4 a farewell party was given for the fifth-year girls. The party was a buffet followed by a program the Doughty's gave on their European trip. This completed the 1971-72 year. We had two members that were Heath Key recipients. At the annual College of Pharmacy Honors Banquet, Professor Doughty, our chapter advisor, was made a Patron.

The 1972-73 school year began with a picnic in the Doughty's backyard to meet the new third-year girls. For the fall semester service projects were Halloween treats, Thanksgiving baskets and participation in the Mini-Telethon for the children's ward. Our big money making project was a car wash held on the parking lot of the College of Pharmacy. The chapter sponsored a formal Christmas dance, December 9, at the University's alumni house, for the whole College of Pharmacy.

Second semester began with rush functions. January 20, the rushees were taken to Danville to tour the Ephraim McDowell House and Apothecary Shop. Upon returning to Lexington, the Doughty's invited us to their home for refreshments. January 26, we had a slumber party and on January 29, we had a progressive dinner. On February 13, a pledge ceremony was held, and thirteen girls pledged. At a combined LKS activation and Hygeia Day program the thirteen girls were initiated. For the professional project, the chapter had displays on poison prevention at two of the shopping malls and presented talks to elementary school children. Also, a donation of fifty dollars was given to SS HOPE. The annual spring banquet was held April 19 with installation of officers, and chapter awards being given. The final event of the year was an ice cream social given in honor of graduating members and held on April 25.

Regarding extra-curricular activities, two of our sisters, Patrice Ward (72) and Gail Silber (73), were each elected President of the SAPHa while Virginia Galizia (70), Coleen Chericci (72), and Adrienne Dalton (72), each served as President of the Pan Hellenic Association. Jean Roughley (71) was editor of the Vincention, the University yearbook. Alpha Pi has been participating in the SAPHa College Bowl since its inception, as well as its Mock Convention. Our sisters have been faithful supporters of the St. Luke's Society, and many participate in the Freshman Orientation Program each year. This is funded by the Alumnae Chapter but given in the name of both collegiate and alumnae chapters. In 1973 the name of the award was changed to the LKS-Cole Award in honor and memory of our Dr. B. Olive Cole. We also sent a contribution to the National Chapter in her honor. In July, 1973, the chapter contributed \$300.00 to the national treasury to be used for the Dr. B. Olive Cole Graduate Educational Grant.

Most of the members of our Alumnae chapter are practicing pharmacists and active in many professional groups.

During the past decade Eta alumnae chapter has contributed greatly in all respects to the success of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

Phi Alumnae Chapter received its charter on December 2, 1947 in Indianapolis. The first officers were: president, Adele Lowe; vice-president, Hazel Stevens; secretary, Lucille Kavanagh; treasurer, Jean Brown. There were 24 dues paying members. In January 1973 they joyously celebrated their silver anniversary at which Mrs. Elizabeth Raiman, Grand vice-president presented the chapter with a silver Revere bowl. Charter members present included Adele (Lobraico) Lowe, Eva (Lorentz) Eskew, G. Florence (Taylor) Ambroz, Joan (Rosner) Dowling, Anita (Batista) Meek, Lucille (Kuhn) Kavanagh, Roselene (Freige) Hider, and Joan Fritz.

In 1951 the chapter contributed to the Building Fund at Butler College of Pharmacy and helped to celebrate the dedication in 1952. At that time they started re-activating the collegiate chapter that had been inactive for the past several years. Each year Phi Alumnae invite the women enrolled in pharmacy at Butler University to a "Get Acquainted" party in October to help the collegiate chapter to rush the new women. They celebrate Hygeia Day with a joint program with the collegiate chapter and entertain the graduating Phi collegiates at a banquet in May. Mothers and Daughters of the Alumnae members are also recognized at the banquet.

Service projects include supplying 3 Christmas gifts annually to patients without families at Firland Sanatorium, and supporting the Childrens' Orthopedic Hospital Christmas card sale each year. The chapter also donates to Project HOPE annually, and has had several Hygeia Day programs on the Ship HOPE. Alpha Gamma Alumnae Chapter of Samford University, Birmingham, Alabama was chartered in 1962 with twenty-two charter members. Current dues paying members total sixteen. We take pride in listing among our members Mrs. Betty Susina, Past Grand Treasurer; Mrs. Juanita Horton, employed by the Food and Drug Administration in Washington, D.C. and Miss Mary Lancaster, employed by State of Alabama Board of Health as a consultant.

Alpha Gamma Alumnae and Collegiate jointly hosted a Southern Regional Meeting in October, 1965.

As a chapter, we have contributed \$125.00 to our national project, HOPE.

Our meetings have had varied attendances for the usual eight meetings a year. We are currently meeting only three times a year. Average attendance has been eight. Our collegiate chapter membership has dwindled because of recent small pledge classes and a large graduating membership. The alumnae are helping in any way we can with the get-togethers and other functions of the collegiate chapter with the new and returning students in this new school year.

THE AWARD OF MERIT

The Award of Merit presentation is one of the most important events of the biennial convention. Constitutional changes made

Our fraternity, through our Constitution, has made great strides particularly with scholarship and visitation during these ten years.

We presented one Cora E. Craven Educational Grant of \$200 in 1962 increasing the number when possible, until now for the 1972-74 biennium we will present five each year. The first Dr. B. Olive Cole Educational Graduate Grant of \$250 was presented in 1973.

Since 1968 Regional Supervisors have visited each chapter within their areas once during the biennium, with transportation expenses being paid by the fraternity. These expenses are also allowed for the presiding officer of the Regional Meetings.

1968 brought a change from train fare to air coach which is more applicable to today's mode of travel.

Our name was officially changed to "fraternity" to conform more closely with most of the P P A member groups.

We now have a new format for The Blue and Gold Triangle with three copies each biennium.

The Eastern Region was divided into Province I and Province II in 1968 with the addition of a Regional Supervisor.

The first Award of Merit was presented in 1968 for outstanding academic efforts to a sister of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

A new formula for qualifications for the Ethel J. Heath Scholarship Key was put into force in 1966. Those graduating Sisters attaining a ranking in the top 10% of their graduating class are eligible to receive the Key.

Yearly dues were raised from three to seven dollars per year over the ten year period.

The designation of Patron is now bestowed upon individuals who show special interest to our organization on the local level.

The first printed Manual of Chapter Operations was published by our Grand Secretary Frances Curran in 1970. This has proved most helpful to the chapters. Two previous editions had been mimeographed.

A re-structured Constitution was presented in 1972 which conforms more closely to the pattern of parliamentary form. The major portion of the work was completed by Julia Pishalski, fraternity parliamentarian.

Other new developments included an expanded alumnae membership program whereby properly sponsored individuals who did not join a chapter while in college may do so after graduation, further expansion of the alumnae-at-large program, addition of a budget and finance committee and presentation of a Distinguished Service Citation to a fraternity member who has contributed outstanding service to the fraternity.

LKS involved in PPA since 1938

Professional Panhellenic Association was already thirteen years old when Lambda Kappa Sigma joined its ranks in 1938. That year also marked the Silver Anniversary of Lambda Kappa Sigma. At that time there were 13 member fraternities in PPA operating through 500 chapters located in 252 colleges in 42 states.

From the time of our joining PPA, Lambda Kappa Sigma members immediately took an active part in the association. The Grand President was selected as the Official Representative to PPA and was sent to all of the PPA conventions. The late Cora Craven, who was Grand President in 1939, attended the PPA convention which was being held in Washington, D.C. and was elected to serve as Member-at-large for 1939-41. During the World War II years (1941-45) when Lambda Kappa Sigma was unable to hold its national conventions, four of the Grand Council members met in Chicago at the 1943 PPA convention and had an opportunity to settle many of the problems that had arisen in the interim. The late Amelia DeDominicis, a past Grand President, was elected Member-at-large for a two year term at the 1949 convention and then served as treasurer of PPA during the following biennium. In 1955, four Lambda Kappa Sigma members travelled to the Poconos for another convention and returned with important committee assignments. The 1957 PPA convention was held in Chicago and Ursula Biermacher, Gamma, was its chairman. Four national officers of Lambda Kappa Sigma attended that convention. In 1959, the PPA convention was in Dearborn, Michigan and Julia

Pishalski, who was the Grand President of Lambda Kappa Sigma at that time, was elected to serve as member-at-large for a two year term and two years later at the Williamsburg convention, she was elected Vice-President - a post which she held for six years. At the 1967 PPA Convention held in Washington, D. C. Julia was elected to its presidency and presided at the next convention which was held at St. Petersburg, Florida. In keeping with our profession, a part of the convention program was a talk on "Drug Use and Abuse" by Dean Fingers of the University of Florida. The next office held by Julia was that of Member-at-large for another two years and currently she is serving as Honorary Advisor. This has totalled up to 14 continuous years of national service to PPA by a member of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

Participation was not restricted to the national level only, for immediately upon joining, our members throughout the country took an active part in the Area PPAs. Barbara Collins, a past Grand President, was chairman of the Chicago PPA. The late Cora Craven, another past Grand President, was president of the Boston Area PPA. Rho chapters in Portland, Oregon helped organize a PPA there in 1947. Virginia Osol, another past Grand President, was instrumental in organizing the Philadelphia PPA in 1952 and served as its president in 1957. Ruth Flaherty, another past Grand President, and Elsie Gassiaro, Alpha, served as presidents of the Boston PPA in 1955 and 1957 respectively. That same year, Julia Pishalski, also a past Grand President, helped organize the Detroit Area PPA and served as its secretary and president.

Back tracking a bit - in 1940, IRAC (Interfraternity Fraternity Research and Advisory Council) was being founded and the three other national conferences: NIC (National Interfraternity Conference representing the men's general fraternities); NPC (National Panhellenic Conference representing the women's general fraternities) and PIC (Professional Interfraternity Conference representing the men's professional fraternities) along with PPA, joined forces to establish a vigorous public relations program as a medium of unity among all fraternities. By virtue of the national office as President of PPA, Julia Pishalski served on the IRAC board. She attended many of their annual meetings and served as Senior and Junior Delegate on this Council. Some of the major issues that PPA along with the other fraternities in IRAC were confronted with within the last ten years were the legal battle to safeguard our official jewelry from being manufactured and sold by other than our official jeweler and the Tax Reform Act which threatened to take away the tax exempt status of the fraternities. These were very costly battles and Lambda Kappa Sigma contributed money to help defray the tremendous expenses involved. Such problems could have never been resolved without the combined effort of all the fraternities comprising IRAC.

At the PPA conventions, opportunity is provided to exchange ideas, get assistance when needed, implement new features, discuss mutual problems, get better acquainted with other professional women in the fraternity world, hear excellent speakers, listen to musical talent and to examine materials used by all fraternities for efficient management. A career

Achievement Award is also given biennially to an outstanding fraternity woman. At the 1973 convention, each fraternity will send two Official Representatives to the convention instead of one in the past. Greater exposure by national officers to PPA will carry a stronger picture back to each respective fraternity and also foster a greater interfraternity spirit of cooperation and mutual benefit among women in the various professions that comprise its membership.

Today in PPA, there are 15 different women's fraternities covering fields of medical technology, nursing, music, physical education, pharmacy, commerce, business administration, law, speech, business and economics, speech arts and speech sciences. Today its members reach out to over 1200 chapters in over 500 colleges in 49 states. In 1975, PPA will be celebrating its 50th year.
