

Deadline is Nov. 15 for Olive Cole Graduate Grant

The Dr. B. Olive Cole Graduate Educational Grant, named for a distinguished member of the fraternity who was a leader in pharmaceutical education, is being offered by the fraternity to financially assist an alumnae member who is enrolled in a program of graduate study and research which will advance her career in the pharmaceutical sciences in an accredited college or university.

For the current biennium, one grant each year is being offered in the amount of \$250.00.

A Dr. B. Olive Cole Graduate Educational Grant Committee, appointed by the Grand President, will select the recipient in accordance with the following rules:

1. The Grant must be applied for by the member.

2. The applicant shall have successfully completed one academic year of graduate study in the pharmaceutical sciences toward the M.Sc., Ph.D. or M.Sc/Ph.D. The Director of her Department must endorse

her application.
3. She must be a member in good stand-

ing with a collegiate or alumnae chapter, or as a Stray Lamb, and be current in her

4. Her chapter must be in good financial standing with the Grand Treasurer (all chapter financial obligations must be met-dues, Triangle assessment, Convention Delegate Fee).

5. Her graduate record (pink card) must be filed by the chapter with the Grand Secretary. If she has moved to another chapter, an affiliation card must be on file.

6. The completed application must be received by the Chairman of the Grant committee by November 15th each year.

IPSF 19th Congress

The 19th Congress of the International Pharmaceutical Student's Federation, of which Lambda is a Member-in-Association, was held at the Faculte de Pharmacie in Chatenay-Malabry, France (a village just outside of Paris). The ten-day Congress drew participants from twenty four countries throughout Europe, Asia and the Americas.

As representative of Lambda Kappa Sigma, I had no actual vote, but all of the United States delegates had a "say" in the one vote to which the U.S. was entitled, as a Full Member country. Kappa Epsilon, Kappa Psi and the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy & worked together as a team to answer the many questions brought to us. Many participants could not understand our exact purpose there: Why a separate group of students wish to be represented at an international congress, especially

at an international congress, since their country was represented. In an article published in "The Congress Mirror" - a news sheet that came out several times during the congress - I attempted to explain our position: that we are an internationally active professional fraternity, dedicated to our science of pharmacy. Also mentioned was the fact that we supplement our national student pharmaceutical association, certainly not compete with it!

Evidence of our participation was varied - from policy-making sessions to speaking in symposia, Mrs. Teri Dowling, former chairman of Information & Education and an active member of Kappa Epsilon, planned and carried out the two symposia which were held during the congress. One, "The Pharmacists' Opportunity as an Environmental Hygienist" described pharmaceutical opportunities in the field of pollution control. A second, "Avenues of Involvement Available to Pharmacists Today and Tomorrow," was planned and carried out by Teri and by Dr. Daniel Hussar, Director of Pharmacy at PCP&S. Dr. Hussar led a very interesting discussion on the topic. The differences among the countries was amazing!

Programs were discussed The Student Exchange program is one of the more successful. A world wide exchange has been coordinated by the chairman of Student Exchange of OPSF. Additional information should be available from your campus SAPhA Chapter.

A Development Fund exists and attempts to aid underdeveloped countries. This year the major program consists of a Book Appeal. Four IPSF member countries are greatly in need of pharmaceutical reference volumes and texts for their educational programs. All our schools of pharmacy will be advised of this list, let's see if we all can help. Again, SAPhA chaters will be advised of the

We were treated royally throughout our ten day visit. Besides the many meetings, we were treated to visits to pharmaceutical manufacturers and wholesalers, meals in the finest French cuisine, an evening cruise along the River Seine, a barbecue at a Chateau (just like the movies), a reception at most fabulous Farewell Ball on the Eiffel Tower. What an ending!

We were kept busy in our spare time (time normally alloted for sleeping) by parties, song-fests and dancing. The friendliness exhibited by everyone was

Next year's congress will be held in Capetown, South Africa. An absolutely

amazing congress has been planned. The slides that were shown and the information provided by the South African participants has us all drooling - it seems to be a very beautiful country.

On the final day of the General Assembly, the following resolution was accepted: that the Student American Pharmaceutical Association and all of the United States Members in Association United States Members-in-Association shall host the 1975 IPSF Congress. This will be held at PCP&S. A tentative agenda has already been formulated, including: tours of Philadelphia, New York City and Washington, D.C., concerts, games, folk dances, and, of course, the meetings. I'm sure that anyone attending will benefit from the wonderful international pharmacy flavor, as I have.







Hello again from the Golden Triangle, Pittsburgh, Pa. In the last issue of the "Blue and Gold Triangle", the editors omitted the concluding paragraphs of Tau Alumnae News. It bears being read because the article concerned the talk given by Dr. Cornel Petrassevich at Tau chapters Hygeia Day meeting. Dr. Petrassevich is a gynecologist-obstetrician in the Pittsburgh area. He was a political prisoner of the Communists for 15 years in the late forties, fifties and early sixties in 18 different prisons in and bordering on his homeland of Romania. He related to Tau chapters horrors and crimes so terrible that they were not to be believed. He was one of only 7000 prisoners from among 400,000 who survived the Communist imprisonment after their takeover of Romania in 1948. Dr. Petrassevich travels to speak at any club or organization who requests him, although he is not in the best of health. When asked why he does so, he replied, that

"America is the last real free country. Let's defend this free country for when the Communists come, they empty your minds." He states he feels he was spared by God while imprisoned so that he can

deliver this message to us.
Silvia Petrassevich, the doctor's niece, is a Tau undergraduate of Lambda Kappa Sigma, studying Pharmacy at Duquesne University. Dr. Petrassevich brought her to America after his arrival here in 1969. In June, Tau Alums held a picnic at

The Eta Alumni chapter had two speakers for their Hygeia Day program: Mr. Leo Lefebyre, who is an engineer by profession and is the President of the Philadelphia Guild for Infant Survivial; and Dr. Raymond Brown, M.D. The following is a summary of the presenta-

The International Guild for Infant Survival, Inc., was founded as the Guild for Infant Survival in Baltimore, Maryland, in November, 1964, to fight the phenomenon of sudden, unexplained infant death ("crib death"). It was formally incorporated in May 1965, as a nonprofit, nonsectarian charitable and nonprofit, nonsectarian charitable and educational organization dedicated to solving this baffling medical mystery through personal assistance, public information and scientific research.

Guild members contact bereaved parents by letter, telephone, and personal visits to ease their emotional burdens and offer a friendly hand.

The Sudden Infant Death Syndrom (SIDS) is a definite medical entity and is the major cause of death in infants after the first month of life. It cannot be predicted or prevented, even by physician. Research to date indicates that the cause of SIDS is not suffocation; aspiration or regurgitation. A minor illness such as a cold may be present, but many victims are entirely healthy prior to death. There appears to be no suffering: death occurs very rapidly, usually during sleep. SIDS is not contagious in the usual sense. Although a viral infection may be involved, it is not a killer virus that threatens other family members or neighbors. SIDS rarely occurs after seven months of age. SIDS is not hereditary; there is no greater chance for it to occur in one family than in another. The baby is not the victim of a freakish disease. As many as 10,000 babies die as a result of the sudden infant death syndrom every year (up to three per 1,000 live births);

over 100 per year alone in Philadelphia.

SIDS, commonly known as "crib death" or "cot death" is a disease which causes from 7,500 to 10,000 infant deaths in the United States. It is best defines by describing a typical case. An apparently

NO PLACE FOR COED FRATS?

to the increasing incidence of mental health problems in the college generation. Too much pressure, they said. Too involved...want too much too fast. Too little time for healthy wholesome relaxacongenial, friendly. cohesive peer group. Too little time for taking a long look at one's own potential.

Emotional and biological differences between college women and college men make it imperative that each experiences that vital period of just "plain growing without taking on a new set of problems. I sincerely believe that membership in a coed fraternity would bring on an overwhelming set of new problems. Perhaps not immediately visible...but almost certain to crop up at some point in time. Surely, it is poor judgment for a girl to burden herself with a social bombshell, at an age when she is striving to strengthen her own self concept, develop her own abilities, compete in the scholastic market, and build those character traits which will sustain her throughout life. As for any fears that men's fraternities

may have that women's lib will descend upon them in wrath if coed membership is not allowed, my sources in that group say "forget it" -- it was never their intention to destroy women's organizations. To those few fraternities that airily proclaim they are rushing women members in the name of sex equality, and those women who seek membership under the umbrella label of "sex equality," I say "exam your motives."

As a writer, trained to get the facts, and

tell the story, I decided to take an "attitude poll" among some of my college acquaintances -- and several persons whom I did not know, but whom I had reason to believe had belonged at one time, to a "quasi" coed fraternity (living under the same room without benefit of full initiation rites). The sorority woman said "I would not exchange my opportunities for developing leadership, for living within the warm understanding of my sorority sister -- and yes, for looking forward to a pleasant association in an alum group, for anything. I think a coed fraternity would be sheer disaster. I love to date, but I wouldn't want the man of my dreams to be underfoot all the time when I was trying to study." A fraternity man said "Not for me. I wouldn't care to when I was trying to study." A fraternity man said "Not for me, I wouldn't care to date a girl who was "one of the boys." Another said, "I know the fellows, and regardless of denials, the girls would end up performing menial tasks...and the women, strangely enough, would "compete with each other for 'favors' from the men -- the men would take advantage of them. Jealousies would build up and have you ever seen anyone more vindictive than you ever seen anyone more vindictive than a jealous female?" As for demeaning and menial tasks, witness the national story recently, recounting how two women had been initiated into a fraternity, had been promised living quarters with private bath, but unfortunately the plumbing did not work, repairs were too costly, so they were using the men's bathroom. And what was one girl's house responsibilities? You guessed it. She was in charge of the commissary, planned the menus, ordered the food, and hired the cook.

Women, on a closeby campus, who had experimented with good feature living.

experimented with coed fraternity living rejected it as "impossible"...the men are too noisy...couldn't stand it"...no privacy"..."even though there were house rules against invasion of my room they were not upheld and I actually became frightened several times. Security is important. I moved out." A psychology male student declared that such an arrangement could "build up a subconscious conflict between men and women, which later the women might transfer to all men in general." At least eight reported it would take all the fun out of

romance!

Abigail Wood, in a column in "Seventeen" says "and what about the temptation to socialize more than you intend to - to join impromptu parties that go on at all hours of the night, or the endless encounter groups that may demand more participation than you wish to give. And despite the increase of brotherly feeling and platonic friendships, there are sometimes pressure for the other kind of relationship. True, you might have those wherever you live, but because of the daily closeness (coed fraternity) unwanted situations are often stickier to manage. Going away to college, even to traditional living quarters, is a big change and a challenge in itself. Some girls cannot handle an extra measure of freedom.

Coed fraternities have been tried before, and failed. They will fail again, but in the time between the experimentation and the failure, we cannot stand by and see our existing sororities and fraternities threatened. And women's fraternities ARE threatened when men surge thru the dorms and urge women not to join sororities, but to join them. And this IS happening. A recent survey by one fraternity disclosed that among the methods suggested by students, for selecting girls to live in their houses, were: rush them the same as we rush men...combine with a selected sorority, rush little sister, friends of little sisters, friends of brothers. While the incursion has not been fatal, it should be stopped, and right now!

laxa- For the last ten years, women's and fraternities have worked hard, and met a real challenge, a challenge that was intent on destroying the rights of private social groups. Just at the point when we are beginning to enjoy an upswing in pledging, a renewed camaraderie between collegiate chapters, and alumnae advisors, a new sense of dedication within the collegiate ranks, it is nothing short of incredible that we should find ourselves on a collision course with another segment of fraternity. We deplore that which in any way would tend to weaken us. Even more important, we deplore that which weakens young womanhood. For the well being of our young generation, I am convinced that the coed fraternity, lacking in redeeming values, has no place within our social

fraternity system.

Several night ago, before a huge banquet crowd of women civic leaders, assembled to honor women of achievement, including 100 outstanding college women, the president of the collegiate chapter of "Women in Communications" challenged those collegiates to even higher achievement ... to responsible leadership ... to social and moral excellence. Her final words: "your strength is in your womanhood ... treasure it ... for you are distinctive" words, it seemed to me, also eloquently summed up the case for women's

fraternity.
