

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

"Regional Meetings--Relic or Asset"

Virginia Osol kept Lambda Kappa Sigma Fraternity alive during World War II by serving as Grand President for 6 years and also as managing editor of the TRIANGLE for 3 of those 6 years. In order to keep the fraternity alive, Virginia and the other Grand Council officers devised many ways to get together to discuss business when travel restrictions made regular national conventions impossible. Members met at the 1941 APhA convention in Detroit, the PPA meeting in Chicago in 1943 and at five Eastern Regional meetings and two Midwestern Regional meetings. Western Regional meetings were not held because the travel distance between chapters was too great. At the 1946 convention in Portland, Oregon, it was decided to continue the regional meetings on a regular basis. Each region would have a meeting in the odd-numbered years between national conventions. We have continued to hold these meetings to this date.

We looked briefly at the current picture of regional meetings at the recent Grand Council Interim Meeting. Grand Council is aware that some members must travel long distances at considerable expense to attend these meetings. It is a considerable expense to the fraternity to send Grand Council officers to these meetings. The money is well spent if the meetings are well planned and well attended. Travel costs are soaring and we must be sure that we are spending our travel dollars wisely. Are regional meetings economical assets?

It is still very important that we meet and communicate. It is important that members from the various chapters exchange ideas, discuss mutual problems and socialize together. It is important that as many members as possible meet the national officers so that these people become real and not just names to be memorized for pledge tests. These exchanges take place at national conventions, regional meetings, visitations and at other professional meetings which Lambda Kappa Sigma sisters attend.

Grand Council will need your help as we evaluate the present needs of the fraternity. We will be discussing this issue at the remaining regional meetings and at the convention in Toledo. Should we continue to have regional meetings? Could we better get together by having Lambda Kappa Sigma functions at APhA conventions and district SPhA meetings? Do visitations by Regional Supervisors satisfy the need for contact between Grand Council and the Chapters? What can we do to get all active collegiate and alumnae chapters represented at regional meetings? I'd like to hear from all of you on this subject. Are regional meetings still valuable assets to Lambda Kappa Sigma or are they becoming historical relics?


This summer Mary completed the twelve-week internship to return to the University of Kentucky for her last year in pharmacy school.

More fun 50 years ago, says pharmacy's founder

Orleans--The co-founder of Livingstons' Pharmacy, Inc. which is celebrating its 50th anniversary this week, recalls that the pharmacy then "was a lot more fun than today. Now you take down a bottle of pills and fill the doctor's prescription. Then we manufactured things."

Mrs. Mary Livingston, a graduate pharmacist, and her late husband, Urban, started the business in May, 1925. In 1975, the pharmacy is still in the family, and is believed to be the only pharmacy on the lower Cape which has been under the same management for so long.

The eldest son, Frederick also a graduate pharmacist, is president, his brother Robert, is treasurer and business manager, and the third brother, William Irving, is a member of the corporation, although he is not involved in the management of the store. Mrs. Livingston is vice president and does some of the buying, including stationery, greeting cards, cosmetics and some of the books.

Livingstons' Pharmacy is not only a family business, but the family is descended from pharmacists. The Livingstons' grandfathers were both pharmacists.

Mary Livingston's father had a pharmacy in Dorchester, while Urban Livingston's father had a pharmacy in Newport, Vt. Both Mary and Urban helped in their fathers' stores as soon as they were old enough.

"In those days, you had to count out things the customers wanted and I did

that," Mrs. Livingston reminisced, "I weighed out powders and things like Epsom salts. I loved doing it, almost before I could see over the top of the counter."

After graduating from Dorchester High School, Mary Livingston did what few girls did at that time; she enrolled in the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy in Boston, where she was one of the two girls in the class of 1916. (Her father had graduated from there in 1896).

Urban Livingston was also in the class of 1916. After graduation, Mary went to work in her father's store, and Urban returned to school for a post graduate degree as a pharmaceutical chemist. He also worked part time in the Dorchester pharmacy.

He served in World War I and was "gassed" in an accident in an Army chemical laboratory in Baltimore. This later led to the move to the Cape.

The couple was married in 1919 and moved to Newport, Vt. where they bought out the elder Livingston's partner in the store. However, because of the effects of the gassing, Urban Livingston was advised to move from the cold Vermont climate.

"We saw a store advertised for sale in Orleans," Mrs. Livingston said. "Urban came down and looked at it and came back and said I should look at it. My father and I came down and looked at the store, and I borrowed from father and put a down payment on it."

The Mrs. Livingston became a career woman with a husband and family. She ran the store in the building on the corner of Main Street, now torn down, single-handed for two months until her husband could sell the Vermont business.

However, when he arrived she did not retire to fulltime housekeeping. The eldest son, Fred, was born in Vermont, but the other two were born on the Cape.

"I had to be in the store when Urban wasn't there," she said, "I had help at home. I would eat and then go down to the store and Urban would go home for his meal."

She recalled how pharmacists worked in those days. "We compounded prescriptions," she said. "We made ointments. We made tinctures (an alcohol solution

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this 3rd day of October, 1975, by and between LAMBDA KAPPA SIGMA, TAX EXEMPT UNINCORPORATED PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION ORGANIZED AND EXISTING UNDER THE LAWS OF THE State of Massachusetts, hereinafter referred to as "Grantor", and UNION STATE BANK OF CARMEL, INDIANA, hereinafter referred to as "Trustee";

WITNESSETH that:

1. **Name of Trust.** The name of this trust shall be THE LAMBDA KAPPA SIGMA EDUCATIONAL TRUST.

2. **Purposes of Trust.** The purposes of this trust are to devote and apply the trust property and income to be derived therefrom exclusively for scientific, literary and educational purposes, with particular emphasis being to advance deserving students in the field of pharmacy; provided, however, that no part of this trust fund shall inure to the benefit of any substantial contributor, award committee member, officer of the grantor organization or any other disqualified person within the meaning of §4946 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code. No part of the activities of this trust shall consist of carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation or of participating in, or intervening in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision hereof, this trust shall not conduct or carry on any activities not permitted to be conducted or carried on by an organization or trust which is tax exempt or an organization or trust donations to which are deductible from taxable income to the extent allowed by the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and other applicable legislation and

**Minutes of the Third Biennial
INTERIM GRAND COUNCIL MEETING
July 26, 1975 - Des Peres, Mo.**

The third biennial Interim Meeting of the Grand Council of Lambda Kappa Sigma was called to order at 9:00 a.m. on July 26, 1975, at the home of the Grand President, Mrs. Marilyn Haberle, 12543 Elaine Drive, Des Peres, Mo., by the Grand President. The fraternity prayer was said in unison.

Roll call:

Grand President, Marilyn Haberle, present; Grand Vice President, Mary Wills, present; Grand Secretary, Frances Curran, present; Grand Treasurer, Shirley McCloskey, present; Grand Editor, Pamela Ehlers, present; Member-at-Large, Adele Lowe, present; Eastern Regional Supervisor I, Elsie Galgani, present; Eastern Regional Supervisor II, Marian Ricardo, present; Midwest, Regional Supervisor, Judith Riffie, present; Western Regional Supervisor, Toni Farrell, present; Southern Regional Supervisor, Mary Grear, absent; Honorary Advisor, Julia Pishalski, present.

The minutes of the Grand Council meetings of July 18-23, 1974 were approved as mailed.

Each officer gave an oral report of the activities of her office. As the reports progressed, various matters were acted upon and topics discussed. The report of the Southern Regional Supervisor, Mary Grear was read by Marilyn Haberle.

The Grand Treasurer distributed copies of the auditors' report for 1974-75 and the report was discussed in some detail.

The Grand Treasurer announced that jewelry prices would be increasing in some categories but not all. A new contract will be signed with Balfour. It was agreed that the new jewelry prices should be published in the TRIANGLE as well as being sent to the chapters.

Shirley McCloskey, GT, suggested that we should explore the possibility of having someone other than herself to handle the jewelry orders exclusively. The matter was discussed and several suggestions as to ways the orders might be handled were put forth. Several ideas are to be explored before the 1976 Convention.

The Grand Secretary reported on the correspondence with Dr. Kawasaki, Kobe Gakuin University, Japan concerning organizing a chapter of LKS at that pharmacy school. Cisci Kihara (Alpha Xi, University of the Pacific) has arranged to meet Dr. Kawasaki on her trip to Japan this summer. She will report to the Grand Council upon her return. It was agreed to proceed cautiously in this matter.

Grand Editor Pam Ehlers reported on the 3 issues of the TRIANGLE in the past year. There are 910 Life Subscribers (only 3 of which pay dues as stray lambs); at the present time the costs of sending them copies are covered by current income.

Fifty Year Members: The following procedure will be used to expedite certification of 50-year members - Chapters wishing to honor a 50-year member will send her name and address to the Grand Treasurer who will determine her dues status and Life Subscriber status; the information will then be forwarded to the Grand Secretary who will verify membership in the blue card file, prepare the Certificate and send the certificate to the Grand President; the Grand President will write a personal note to the member and include the Certificate and permanent dues-paid card received from the Grand Treasurer.

The Grand Secretary reported on PPA matters: the status of professional fraternities under Title IX of the Education act is still uncertain: she detailed the program on drug abuse, titled "The Polymathic Experience" to be presented at the 1975 PPA convention in Milwaukee: the PPA Handbook was not quite ready for distribution at this time: a group insurance program which might possibly be sponsored by PPA was described by Marilyn Haberle - no action was taken on the matter.

Plans for the 1976 Convention to be held in Toledo, Ohio with joint hosting by Alpha Mu, Omicron and Alpha Iota Chapters. Tentative dates are July 26-29th and the Grand Council will meet on July 24th and 25th. The dates will depend in part on the dormitory obtainable at the University of Toledo: confirmation should be available by September.

Plans for coming regional meetings were outlined. Lambda chapter has already hosted the S. Western Regional attended by Alpha Xi and Lambda.

It was agreed that Regional Supervisors should try to attend S.A.Ph.A. regional meetings whenever possible in order to

contact sisters who otherwise do not attend LKS regional meetings.

The IRAC meeting was reviewed briefly by Marilyn Haberle. A suggestion was that the Grand Editor should send copies of the TRIANGLE to the Deans of all our Colleges. A super fraternity event will be held in Williamsburg, Virginia from November 30th to December 2nd to help celebrate the 200 anniversary of the founding of Phi Beta Kappa. It was agreed that LKS would commit 2 rooms with a minimum of 4 members attending. These reservations are to be coordinated through PPA.

Julia Pishalski, Chairman of the LKS Educational Trust Committee presented a detailed trust agreement as worked out by Attorney Robert Campbell. The Council examined the agreement line by line with explanations by Julia Pishalski and Adele Lowe. A few minor corrections were made.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the Council accept the report of the LKS Educational Trust Committee.

The membership is to be informed of the availability of the Trust so that donations can be made. Several details remained to be worked out and this was left to the Committee.

It was moved, seconded and passed that we instruct our attorney to continue the work toward the application for tax exempt status and for eventual completion of the Lambda Kappa Sigma Educational Trust.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the attorney be paid for his services in connection with preparation of the Trust at the rate of \$50.00 per hour.

A recruiting brochure featuring women and pharmacy was discussed. It was agreed that a committee composed of Frances Curran (chairman), Marian Ricardo, Mary Wills and Patricia Clancy Kienle be appointed to work out the details.

Cora Craven Grants - 21 applicants from 14 chapters applied in 1974.

B. Olive Cole Grant - there was only one applicant in 1974. It was agreed to concentrate harder, especially through the TRIANGLE.

The Distinguished Service Award, which has not yet been presented, was discussed. A committee composed of Adele Lowe (chairman), Marian Ricardo and Toni Farrell was appointed to work on details and prepare a form on which chapters could submit names for the award; a deadline of March 15th was set for submissions.

Toni Farrell reported on the 1975 Coffee Hour at the APhA Meeting in San Francisco. The 1976 meeting will be held in New Orleans; Judy Riffie may be able to be present.

The US Bicentennial and the 50th Anniversary of PPA will be celebrated at the 1976 Convention. Mary Wills is chairman of the program and will arrange favors and decorations.

It was moved, seconded and passed that a maximum of \$300 be allotted from the Treasury in connection with the Bicentennial celebration at convention.

TRIANGLE deadlines for 1975-76 were set for September 30, December 5 and February 15.

It was moved, seconded and passed that a 4 drawer file be purchased for LKS archives, that the file be stored in the NIC (National Interfraternity Council) headquarters in Indianapolis, and that Adele Lowe be designated as Archivist.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the Grand Council explore the possibility of obtaining an assistant for the Grand Treasurer to handle jewelry orders.

It was moved, seconded and passed that Grand President Marilyn Haberle be reimbursed for expenses incurred in attending the IRAC meeting in Indianapolis.

It was moved, seconded and passed that Marilyn Haberle be reimbursed for expenses incurred in hosting this interim meeting.

It was agreed that letters should be sent to Alpha Zeta Alumnae and Alpha Zeta Collegiate chapters for their great assistance in making the Interim meeting a success and for all the work they performed with sisterly affection.

The meeting was adjourned at midnight.

regulations as they now exist or may hereafter be amended.

3. **Trust Fund.** The Trustee may receive donations from the Grantor or from any other source in cash or in other property acceptable to it. All donations so received, together with the income therefrom, herein referred to as the trust fund, shall be held, managed, administered, invested, reinvested and paid out by the Trustee pursuant to the terms of this agreement. No person shall be required to see to the application of any money, securities or other property paid or delivered to the Trustee, or to inquire into any action, decision or authority of the Trustee.

4. **Use of Trust Fund.** The Trustee shall apply the trust fund, at such time or times, in such manner, and in such amounts as may be determined by the awarding committee, in accordance with the terms and conditions as specifically set out in the succeeding paragraphs of this agreement; provided, however, said application of the trust fund herein established shall be limited to the uses and purposes set out in paragraph 2 hereof.

5. **Awarding Committee.** There is hereby established an Awarding Committee, hereinafter referred to as the "Committee", consisting of seven (7) persons designated by the Grand Council of Grantor. Grantor shall certify to the Trustee the names of those persons selected to the Committee and each member thereof shall serve in such capacity until he or she shall die, resign, or for any reason cease to act, or until such time as he or she shall be removed by the Grand Council of Grantor, and any such vacancy in said Awarding Committee shall be filled by the said Grand Council. All decisions shall be made by a majority of the Awarding Committee and in any event by not less than four (4) members of said Committee.

6. **Awards.** The Committee shall direct the Trustee to apply the net income and so much of the trust corpus as in its judgment shall be proper in furtherance of the higher education of students who are pursuing a pharmacy education at any fully accredited college or university as a full time degree-seeking student.

The awards may be by grant or loan, under rules to be set up by the Committee and Trustee in accordance with the provisions hereof. The recipients shall be students who show promise of being able to benefit from full time college instruction with particular emphasis in the field of pharmacy. In making the selections, the following criteria shall be important: 1) good character; 2) good citizenship; 3) need; 4) above average intelligence; 5) good scholastic record, and 6) recommendations from faculty or other appropriate persons or firms having particular knowledge or information concerning any candidate's qualifications. The selection shall be made pursuant to a procedure approved in advance by the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, or his delegate, as provided in Internal Revenue Code S4945(g), any other provision hereof to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Committee shall select such recipients who, in their judgment, are deserving of financial assistance and are likely to succeed as degree-seeking pharmacy students. The Committee shall award to such recipients such sums of money as they, in their judgment, believe will be of benefit, and they may determine the amount or amounts thereof and whether the same should be in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, or other financial aid, on any terms and conditions that they deem wise. All said moneys shall be paid by the Trustee directly to the college or university of the recipient's choice, for said recipient's benefit, after the recipient has been accepted by and enrolled in said college or university. The Committee may make more than one award to any student who has previously been the recipient of a prior award, so long as said recipient is continuing a full time course of pharmacy study at a college or university, including post-graduate studies, but in no event shall any one person receive a grant or grants totalling, in the aggregate, more than Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00).

7. **Compensation of Awarding Committee.** The Awarding Committee shall be entitled to reimbursement for expenses, but shall receive no compensation for their services.

8. **Compensation of Trustee.** The Trustee shall be entitled to such

compensation for its services as is customary for corporate fiduciaries performing the duties herein provided for and shall be entitled to the payment of all its expenses hereunder.

9. **Trustee's Powers.** In the administration of this trust and of the trust fund, the Trustee shall have all powers and authority necessary or available to carry out the purposes of this trust and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, shall have the following powers and authority, all subject, however, to the condition that no power or authority shall be exercised by the Trustee in any manner or for any purpose whatsoever which may not be exercised by an organization which is tax exempt or by an organization donations to which are deductible from taxable income to the extent allowed by the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and other applicable legislation and regulations as they now exist or may hereafter be amended:

a) To receive the income, profits, rents, and proceeds of the trust fund, and to collect and receipt for the same.

b) To purchase, subscribe for, retain, invest and reinvest in securities or other property wherever situated, and without any requirement for diversification as to kind or amount.

c) To sell for cash or on credit, convert, redeem, exchange for other securities or other property, or otherwise dispose of any securities or other property at any time held by it.

d) To pay all administration expenses of this trust and any taxes imposed upon it, and to settle, compromise, or submit to arbitration any claims, mortgages, debts, or damages due or owing to or from this trust, to commence or defend suits or legal proceedings, and to represent this trust in all suits or legal proceedings.

3) To exercise any conversion privilege or subscription right available in connection with any securities or other property at any time held by it; to consent to the reorganization, consolidation, merger or readjustment of the finances of any corporation, company, or association, or the sale, mortgage, pledge, or lease of the property of any corporation, company or association, any of the securities of which may at any time be held by it, and to do any act with reference thereto, including the exercise of options, the making of agreements or subscriptions, and the payment of expenses, assessments, or subscriptions which may be deemed necessary or advisable in connection therewith, and to hold and retain any securities or other property which it may so acquire.

f) To vote personally, or by general or limited proxy, any shares of stock which may be held by it at any time, and similarly to exercise personally, or by general or limited power of attorney, any right appurtenant to any securities or other property held by it at any time.

g) To borrow money in such amounts and upon such terms and conditions as shall be deemed advisable or proper to carry out the purpose of this trust and to pledge any securities or other property for the repayment of any such loan.

h) To hold part or all of the trust fund uninvested.

i) To employ suitable accountants, agents, counsel, and custodians and to pay their reasonable expenses and compensation.

j) To register any securities held by it hereunder in its own name or, to the extent permitted by law, in the name of a nominee with or without the addition of words indicating that such securities are held in a fiduciary capacity, and to hold any securities unregistered or in bearer form.

k) To make, execute and deliver all instruments necessary or proper for the accomplishment of the purpose of this trust or of any of the foregoing powers, including deeds, bills of sale, transfers, leases, mortgages, security agreements, assignments, conveyances, contracts, purchase agreements, waivers, releases and settlements.
