President's Message

Webster's definition of a delegate is "One sent and empowered to act for another." The delegate acts according to the wishes of the person or group represented, and speaks not only for herself, but for those represented. As commonly understood in parliamentary law and as used by ROBERTS RULES OF ORDER, the term convention refers to an assembly of delegates who are chosen specifically for each convention as representatives of a chapter of a larger group to sit as a single deliberative body acting in the name of the entire group. This sounds lofty, but it simply means that when Miss X becomes a delegate to a convention, she represents a group and not herself alone. The delegate has specific duties. When a person becomes the official delegate, they must attend the convention. At the convention, the delegate must be present at all business meetings, and they must be prepared to give an informative report to their chapter upon returning from the convention.

The delegate is free to vote as they see fit on questions at the convention except on those issues where they have been instructed by their chapter to vote in a certain way on scheduled issues.

The generalizations all apply to the chapter delegates who will attend our convention in Albany, New York. The chapter has some responsibility to the delegate. All materials that will arrive

prior to the convention should be discussed by the chapter, and the delegate should receive specific instructions on how she should vote when these issues are discussed at the convention. The instructions should be voted and become a part of the chapter minutes. The delegate can take a copy of the minutes along as a reference during the convention deliberations.

The delegate should bring all necessary chapter reports with her to the convention as well as any material that is sent to the chapter for prior discussion within the chapter and further discussion and final deliberation at the convention.

By following these guidelines, Lambda Kappa Sigma will have a convention body prepared to discuss the issues and to vote with knowledge on a particular subject. Since the delegate performed with skill and knowledge at the convention, she will prepare and present an accurate and informed report of the meeting to her chapter. The chapter can then begin the next biennium with current information that will help the chapter and the fraternity grow and prosper.

We are looking forward to an exciting experience as we meet in Albany, New York for the 25th Biennial Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma as the guests of our Beta sisters.

STUDENT WINS AWARD



Lillian R. Shukur, a fifth-year student in the School of Pharmacy, has won the Student Award presented by the Research and Education Foundation of the American Society of Hospital Pharmacists (ASHP). Her award winning paper is titled "The Pharmacist's Effect on the Application of Clinical Pharmacokinetics in the Assessment of Procainamide Therapy." She is the first UW student to win the honor.

The award, a \$500 honorarium, will be presented at the 12th annual ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting Dec. 8 in Atlanta, Ga.

Ms. Shukur won the National Association of Retail Druggists-Lilly local award as a third-year student in 1975. In May, 1977, she won first place in the 11th annual Student American Pharmaceutical Association (SAPhA) Papers Competition.

Ms. Shukur is the regional coordinator for SAPhA. The regional convention, to be held Nov. 4-6 in Seattle, will include students from Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Washington.

Ms. Shukur is a 1973 graduate of Richland High School. She was born in Montreal and moved as a child with her family to Baghdad, Iraq. In 1971 she

moved to Richland and resided with her aunt and uncle while she completed high school. Her parents live in New York City.

Lillian is a member of Lambda Kappa Sigma Chi Collegiate Chapter. She has always been an active Chi sister and is this year's Chi Pledge Trainer.

CLARA WELLS

Born on October 12, 1898, was one of Lambda Kappa Sigma's most dedicated and loyal members, Clara Wells. She was one-half of probably our most famous sister duos in the fraternity. We always anticipated seeing them both at every convention.

A native Californian, Clara attended elementary and high schools in Red Bluff, California. After graduating from high school in 1918 she attended California College of Pharmacy which is now the University of California Medical Center Department of Pharmacy. She graduated in 1920.

After becoming a Registered Pharmacist in April 1924 she held employment in most all types of retail pharmacies plus fifteen years in hospital pharmacy. The two sisters had their own store from 1937 until 1953. From then on until her retirement in 1964, she was employed in part time pharmacy work.

She was a charter member of both Zeta Collegiate and Zeta Alumnae Chapters holding offices in both chapters and had attended 13 National Conventions. In 1972, she received her 50 Year Certificate of Membership along with her sister Norma and Ruth Flaherty at the St. Louis Convention.

All of us who were privileged to know Clara will miss her - especially at convention time. Her dedication and devotion to our fraternity over the years was a superior quality which she had.

Alumnus Named to Board of Pharmacy

The following article appeared in the UCSF Alumnus news letter. Mary Ann Kimble was initiated into Lambda Kappa Sigma by Alpha Xi Chapter at University of Pacific. When she transferred to UCSF, Mary Ann affiliated with Zeta Chapter. She was a Ethel J. Heath Key recipient. The sisters of Lambda Kappa Sigma are very proud of Mary Ann Kimble.

The face which appeared on the TV screen was distinctly Asian and it said:

Professional Fraternity Association Results From Consolidation

The Professional Panhellenic Association (founded, 1925) and the Professional Interfraternity Conference (founded, 1928), meeting jointly and separately at Stouffer's Indianapolis Inn, October 19-22, voted to consolidate into the Professional Fraternity Association (PFA) representing thirty-four national and international fraternities with over one and a half million members.

Recent years had seen increasing cooperation between the two interfraternity organizations. The PPA members were originally women's fraternities in nine professional fields. The PIC members have traditionally been men's professional fraternities in eleven fields. Many fraternities in both organizations have become coed in the last few years.

Highlighting the events at the meeting in Indianapolis were the Keynote Address by Betty Mullins Jones, Treasurer of the Interfraternity Research and Advisory Council, at the Welcome Luncheon on Thursday, October 20; and the Address by Betty Southard Murphy, Member, National Labor Relations Board and PPA Career Achievement Award Winner, at the Dinner on Friday, October 21.

Joint Workshops on a variety of topics of interest to professional fraternity leaders developed the PPA theme "Key to the Future" and the PIC meeting theme "Improving Your Professional Fraternity."

Elected as initial members of the Board of Directors of the Professional Fraternity Association were Mary Ellin Frohmader, President, from Madison, Wisconsin; Fredrick J. Weitkamp, President-Elect, Granada Hills, California; Dr. Andrew J. Hopkins, Secretary, Dearborn, Michigan; Paula Manthe, Treasurer, Milwaukee, Wisconsin; and Frank J. Brye and Madge C. Gerke, both of Indianapolis, Indiana, Directors-at-Large. Alan E. Adams, retiring as PIC President, will serve on the PFA Board as Past President. Mr. Byrne Belcher, of St. Louis, Missouri, was selected to represent the Associate Members of the new organization. Robert E. Pope of St. Louis, formerly Executive Secretary of the PIC, was named by the Board of Directors as Executive Secretary of the PFA.

"Hello, my name is Mary Anne Koda, I'm a senior student, and I would like to talk to you about antacids..." The year was 1969; the face came from a videotaped lecture made by a group of UCSF pharmacy students; it was distributed by the now defunct Society for the Continuation of Pharmaceutical Education (SCOPE) and was shown at approximately 13 local association meetings. It marked Mary Anne Kimble's (nee Koda) debut to the profession. She's said a lot since then, and you can be certain that you will hear a lot more from her in the future. Mary Anne, it seems, is now a member of the California State Board of Pharmacy - the second woman, and the first person of an Asian ancestry to hold the position. And, it's no wonder because Mary Anne is something of a wonder.

Born in Merced, California in 1946, she first came to the attention of the faculty in 1965 - at which time she enrolled in UCSF. It didn't take long for everyone to realize that she was aboard: she rapidly revealed her keen mind and frank, outspoken demeanor. While not unusual now, it was highly unusual then.

Beyond that, there's much to say, and to little space to say it in. When she graduated in 1969, she received "honorable mention" and the Bowl of Hygieia Award (the highest honor the students and faculty can bestow upon a student). After one year with Kaiser Foundation Hospital in San Francisco, she popped back to UCSF first as a staff pharmacist, then as a clinical pharmacist assigned to the hospital floors, then as instructor in charge of the third year (Junior) clinical pharmacy courses, and then as Vice Chairperson of the Division of Clinical Pharmacy. Along the way she gave lots of lectures before various pharmacist audiences, got involved in a large number of other undergraduate courses, served for four years on the Board of Directors of the Alumni Association, published 9 articles, co-edited the first textbook on clinical pharmacy, (Applied Therapeutics for Clinical Pharmacists), was twice the recipient of the graduating class's Teacher of the Year Award, was a member of the FDA OTC Drug Review Panel on Vitamins, served on the Board of the San Francisco Lung Association, and so on, and so on. You get the idea. It has been a busy career for a rather capable person.

Mary Anne is married to a pharmacist (Donald), and it is rumored that they occasionally have time to see each other. Nevertheless we are proud of the fact that her attributes have been recognized by Governor Brown, and know that the Board of Pharmacy will benefit from her presence. We all wish her the best of everything.







Internal revenue Service Developments
 The I.R.S. on October 17 released a new set of procedures under which group exemption letters can be issued. Revenue Procedure 77-38 (superseding Rev. Proc. 72-41, 1972-2 C.B. 820) sets forth revised procedures under which recognition of exemption from Federal income tax under Section 501 (c) of the I.R.S. Code may be obtained on a group basis for subordinate organizations affiliated with and under the general supervision or control of a central organization. The new procedure relieves each of the subordinates covered by a group exemption from filing its own application for recognition of exemption. A copy of the new regulations has been sent to the PFA Executive Secretary and is available upon request.


