Article Features Charter Member

On September 14, 1978, an article by Jane M. Estes appeared in the Cape Cod Oracle featuring Mary Connolly Livingston, one of our living charter members. Mrs. Livingston was one of the women students at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy at the time Lambda Kappa Sigma was born. Being one of the eight students interested in forming their luncheon club, she became a charter member of "Lambda Kappa." She was secretary-treasurer of the club. We are very proud of Mary and she should certainly be an inspiration to all of us!

What is it like to have one other woman and 44 men as college classmates? Mary Connolly Livingston knows because those were the odds when she graduated from the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy (MCP) in 1916, and she claims the men in her class were "very helpful."

But it is doubtful that Mary Livingston has ever depended too much on others for help, especially where pharmaceutical matters are concerned.

For over 40 years she was a registered pharmacist, and today, at 84, Mrs. Livingston still works with her sons at the pharmacy she and her husband founded in Orleans over 50 years ago.

It seems pharmacy has always been her first love. "Before I was old enough to see over the counter," says Mary Livingston, "I had already worked a lot of hours counting pills, packaging salves, and waiting on customers at my father's drugstore in Dorchester."

Her strong eyes are extra bright as she reminisces, "Whenever my mother was looking for me, she'd send someone down to the store. She knew I'd be there."

When it came time to consider college, Mary Livingston decided that like her father who was the class of 1864 she, too, would head to MCP. She was confident her being a woman would not keep her out of the profession even though in 1912, Mary's freshman year, pharmacy was a man's field.

After graduation she managed her father's store for two years and then, in 1918, married the late Urban S. Livingston, a former college classmate.

The two moved to Vermont, and while Urban ran his father's drugstore, Mary stayed out of the business to help raise their sons. By 1925, however, husband and wife were ready to open up shop together.

Because Urban's health was suffering from the cold Vermont winters, Mary investigated a drugstore for sale on Cape Cod.

Convinced the climate would be moderate on the Cape, she purchased the store, and the family moved to Orleans where Livingstons' Pharmacy became the first drugstore in town and the only pharmacy for miles.

Livingstons' Pharmacy has been in existence for over 50 years now, and the couple maintained an active part in the business together until Urban's death in 1974.

Mary Livingston has experienced real changes in the pharmacy business and says that for her the practice of pharmacy "just isn't as fun anymore." It may be convenient that today suppliers deliver premixed and prepackaged medicines to the store, but Mary says she remembers a "more exciting

way."

"Urban and I used to mix and package almost all our own medicines and pills," she says. To illustrate her point, she pulls out a book filled with "recipes" the two used for making everything from horehound cough drops to suppositories.

The store itself has also changed. The present building is probably five times the size of the original pharmacy with at least five times the staff.

"When we first opened the store," says Mrs. Livingston, "Urban and I managed it alone, and in order to take our two-week vacation, which we really needed, we had to

I wish to express my gratitude for the honor you have given me in awarding me the B. Olive Cole Educational Grant. This will aid my graduate studies in the profession of Pharmacy.

Before attending Massachusetts College of Pharmacy from which I graduated in 1968, I had taught science, math, and other subjects in the grammar and high schools of my Community, the Sisters of St. Joseph of Boston. Several years after I had offered to serve as a nurse in our infirmary, Bethany, my Community requested that I, instead, become a pharmacist as Bethany received its hospital license. Since graduating I have been a member of the ASHP, APha, MSPA, and MSHP where I was Secretary for two years and currently Vice-President of our alumnae chapter of LKS.

In 1975 I began graduate studies at MCP in the recently initiated Evening Masters Program, choosing my major concentration in therapeutics, as this was most closely allied with my goal in the profession: total services to my patients, for although limited in time by administrative duties as director of pharmacy, I have attempted several clinical services such as patient admission and discharge interviews, unit dose medication system, on-floor review of medication orders with physician and nurse, and an IV preparation program, always with as much personal contact between nursing and pharmacy, participation in the Utilization Review and Audit Committees of the Medical Staff as well as the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee.

I look forward to improving our services to our geriatric outpatients by personal follow-up visits to reinforce the reasons for taking medications and developing a method of making compliance easier for them.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

YOU Can Make a Difference!

Among pharmacy students and practicing pharmacists all of us from time to time hear comments referring to the gap that exists between what is being taught in pharmacy schools as the ideal standard of modern pharmacy practice, and what the situation is "in the real world" of pharmacy today. It is true that in many instances there does appear to be a difference in standards today, and that has been the case through Pharmacy's many years of development. It is my opinion that these consistently higher ideals set by the educational processes in our profession have served to urge and encourage the quality of pharmacy practice in its upward trend.

As you contemplate your future in pharmacy, concentrate on these two areas:

Communicative Skills. Being a good communicator is playing an increasingly important role in today's health care system. If you expect a better, more satisfying role on the health care team, you must develop communicative skills beginning on the internship level. Being able to accurately and effectively interact with patients, physicians and other health care personnel is, I feel, the primary key to unlocking some of these elusive "professional doors." Be accurately informed and up to date in your information. Be confident and verbalize your thoughts carefully. Be courteous and patient with others.

Concern for the Patient. Sometimes I think we minimize the "care" in "patient care." The patient must always be your primary concern. Genuine concern for the welfare and overall comfort and convenience of the patient is of paramount importance in your dealings with other health professionals. After all, the goal of the health team is superb patient care.

Changes do not occur overnight; nor sometimes even in what we would consider a reasonable length of time as we observe evidences of alterations in the system. Slowly, however, changes in pharmacy practice are occurring and these evidences are traceable primarily to committed, highly motivated pharmacists who with a determined, positive attitude gradually, patiently are working within the system to make the adjustments—small, scarcely noticeable at first, but with persistence and concern, eventually major professional breakthroughs occur.

Lambda Kappa Sigma has as one of our objectives "to encourage a high standard of professional ethics and scholarship" among our members.

I challenge every one of you to meet that objective, and to surpass it by being committed positively to the maintenance and improvement of quality pharmacy practice today and in the future.




She is a member of the University of Texas Ladies Club, and has just finished serving a year as President of the Newcomers Group of 200 women.
