



"Spectrum '78" was the theme for the first annual convention of the Professional Fraternity Association at the Sheraton-Southfield Hotel in Southfield, Michigan, October 19-21.

The Professional Fraternity Association is the result of the consolidation of the Professional Interfraternity Conference and the Professional Panhellenic Association last October. Twenty-seven of the 34 member fraternities were present for the 1978 PFA convention.

Lambda Kappa Sigma is especially proud that our own Marilyn Haberle, Grand President 1974-78, was elected to the office of President-Elect. This essentially indicates that Marilyn will be moving into the office of President of PFA in the next two years. Other members of LKS who were in attendance at the convention were Grand President Judy Riffée, Grand Secretary Avis Ericson, and former Grand President and also former President of PPA Julia Pishalski.

The convention program included pertinent topics of interest: Copyright Legislation; Legal and Legislative Action; Foundations—Why and How, were presented by Harold Catchpole, CPA; Fraternities and Taxes was the subject reported on by Frederick J. Weitkamp; and a workshop on Substance Abuse in Academia heard a panel including Dick Morin, M.D., Brighton Hospital, and Michael Palmen, M.D., Substance Abuse Center, University Hospital, Ann Arbor.

Speaking at the Friday luncheon was M. Jane Kay, vice-president of employee relations, Detroit Edison Company. Miss Kay was the PPA Career Achievement Award Winner in 1973. At the banquet Bob Clifton, education director and assistant to the

Dean of Student Affairs of Wayne State University's College of Medicine, spoke on "Stresses on Students."

Saturday's program included workshops on "What's Happening on Campus," chaired by Dorothy L. Frankelton, vice-president for Student Affairs at Wayne State University, and a fraternity executives' workshop, in charge of Mr. Weitkamp.

Robert E. Pope, Theta Tau, was reappointed as executive secretary.

The 1978 convention committee included Andrew J. Hopkins, Phi Beta Pi-Theta Kappa Psi; Virginia Schulte, Phi Gamma Nu, and Julia Pishalski, Lambda Kappa Sigma.

The final luncheon of the convention was hosted by Lambda Kappa Sigma's Omicron Chapter. Julia Pishalski, Marlene Fichter, and other members of Omicron Alumnae chapter furnished the tables with beautiful fall flowers and provided several "pharmaceutical favors" at the tables... apparently not a common practice among other fraternities and a real conversation piece. A member of Omicron collegiate chapter, Nancy Matyunas, also participated in the Saturday afternoon panel discussion, "What's Happening on Campus?"

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

How will E.R.A. affect fraternities and sororities... social and professional? Will there be a different interpretation of the law for the social fraternal groups versus the professional fraternities, as is happening with Title IX of the Equal Education Act?

With extension by Congress of the time limit for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, intense interest in this subject continues.

E.R.A. supporters and a Library of Congress study insist it would be up to the courts to decide in individual cases whether fraternities and sororities could continue to be sexually exclusive. E.R.A. proponents say they expect the courts to rule in favor of the present status.

Opponents of the constitutional amendment, however, recognize that the E.R.A. will doom fraternities, sororities, and all other single sex organizations, institutions, and activities. They further suggest that an organization's tax-exempt status may be firmly tied to its membership composition.

Prof. Thomas Emerson of Yale University is the author of a document describing what proponents said would be the effect of the amendment at the time it was being proposed: "The basic principle of the Equal Rights Amendment is that sex is not a per-


missable factor in determining the legal rights of women or of men. This means that the treatment of any person by the law may not be based upon the circumstances that such person is of one sex or the other. The principle of the amendment must be applied comprehensively and WITHOUT EXCEPTION.




Right in the middle of our school, we had some tables set up. On one long table we arranged our sandwich-assembly line. In


The students enjoying the Alpha Xi Deli sandwiches.

TION." (Yale Law Journal, pp. 889-890, April 1971).

It took a special act of Congress to exempt social sororities and fraternities from the Title IX nondiscrimination provision of the Equal Education Act. Professional fraternities, of course, were not included in this exemption, and for this reason, Lambda Kappa Sigma has filed a petition for individual exemption with H.E.W. However, frankly, I believe it is possible for us to win a battle and still have the outcome of the war very much in question. Should E.R.A. be ratified, single sex organizations most certainly will be thoroughly scrutinized again... this time from a slightly different perspective.

So, the future is very tenuous. There will always be a need for women in pharmacy to bond together in friendship with common professional interests and goals. We must be very alert in these changing times, however, to the preservation of sound principles, as well as to the maintenance of relevance and vitality in our fraternity. Keeping a watchful eye in these areas, Lambda Kappa Sigma should not only survive, but thrive as a vital force in our communities, our colleges, and our profession.



About Plans for Converting Carter Hall to Project HOPE's Use . . .

In 1978 Project HOPE enters its twentieth year of service to the people of developing areas of the world. Despite limited planning and research facilities, the staff has developed new teaching curricula and successfully trained thousands of students and teachers in twenty-five countries and the United States. Project HOPE has held firmly to its philosophy of teaching others to help themselves. Disadvantaged people abroad and at home have been taught to believe in themselves, to have a new hope for their own future.

With the passing years it became apparent that if HOPE was to continue to fulfill responsibilities to those it assists, another facility would be necessary. This necessity became the basis for development of the Project HOPE Health Sciences Education and Research Center. At the Center HOPE will establish a program of scholars-in-residence—men and women with sabbatical leave, whose wisdom and experience can challenge national and international health problems and produce research which meets the highest academic standards.

In addition, HOPE's Health Policy Committee will carry out a series of seminars on current health problems in keeping with the theme: Health and Public Policy. The Committee is composed of experts and representatives from a wide variety of interests from the private sector, including labor, business and various medical professions and institutions.

This Center will service all of HOPE's teaching programs and be the heart of a widely disseminated faculty. Curriculum research and development, program evaluation, language training and preparation and debriefing of faculty going to or returning from various programs are a few of the functions to be carried out at the Center.

Besides renovation on all existing buildings of the Carter Hall complex, one additional building, utilizing the Williamsburg style of architecture, will be built in a wooded site behind the main house. This building will provide approximately 17,000 square feet of working space. Within this building will be a major conference room or auditorium, an audio-visual center, a library, approximately 35 offices and conference rooms and facilities for between 30 and 40 sleeping rooms to accommodate scholars and visitors. A capital funds campaign with a 2½ million-dollar goal has been started to cover renovation and construction of the new building.

Purchase of the Carter Hall complex was made possible through the generosity of three major donors. No funds raised for regular Project HOPE programs will be used. These contributions still go to aid HOPE's continuing goals of teaching, to bring better health to people here and abroad.

A small office will be maintained close to the nation's capital where HOPE has had its international headquarters for the past 20 years. As Dr. Walsh has explained: "We must not lose the confidence of our Washington area friends who have so generously supported this Project."

In addition to its offices in Washington, New York City, Detroit and Los Angeles, HOPE maintains program offices in El Paso, Texas; Kingston, Jamaica; Barbados; Cartagena, Colombia; Quezaltenango, Guatemala; Trujillo, Peru; Natal and Maceio, Brazil; Tunis, Tunisia; Alexandria and Cairo, Egypt; and Krakow, Poland.

Dr. Walsh further explains the move to Northern Virginia this way: "The importance of the development of a campus at

Carter Hall will provide a strong restatement of the purposes for which Project HOPE exists.

"We feel in our 20th year the establishment of a new base for Project HOPE is essential to our future. Our current staff is a strong one, but an institutional location will attract additional competent staff members. As an educational institution we must carry on research and make available a site where outstanding men and women in the field of health sciences can work with us."
